



1910: The Dumb Friends League was incorporated on September 8





1974: Quebec Street Shelter construction was finished in November



1948: A large "modern" shelter was built on South Santa Fe. In the 1970's, the shelter received as many as 45,000 animals annually with a staff of 17.





2002: The Buddy Center, in Castle Rock opens, creating the unique relationship between Douglas County and Dumb Friends League. The land was donated by the county commissioners and the League fundraised over \$3M to build the shelter.

2021: The Dumb Friend League San Luis Valley Animal Center opens in Alamosa.

Implementing inclusive policies and practices



Leslie A. Malone Center - Denver

- Largest shelter 16,000 animals
- Headquarters for organization
- Veterinary and behavior resources
- Foster program

Harmony Equine Center - Franktown

- 70,000 square feet (buildings)
- 168 acres
- Statewide equine impound facility

San Luis Valley Animal Center - Alamosa

- Smallest shelter 2,800 animals
- Smallest team 7 staff
- League's first "rural" shelter
- Heavily supported by Buddy Center and Malone Center – adoptions, veterinary care



Buddy Center – 20 Years



2022: The Buddy Center celebrated 20 years of service and partnership in Douglas County. League staff, volunteer and supporters as well as county leadership gathered to celebrate and commemorate with a rib-bone cutting ceremony.

Since 2002 – over \$1.5M in building upgrades have been completed.



Buddy Center Shelter Statistics

Fiscal Year 2023 (7.1.22 – 6.30.23)

- Intakes: 3,561
 - Stray: 1,249
- Animal Control intakes: 424
- Adoptions: 2,560
- RTO Rate: 50%
- Average Length of Stay
 - Cats: 20.5 days (1.5 days)
 - Dogs: 11.5 days (1.5 days)








Increasing Community Need






Increasing Shelter Population

Cruelty and neglect – Colorado Humane Society

- More frequent
- More animals per case
- Statewide
 - Animals investigated up 158% over 2019
 - Animals impounded up 696% over 2019




Increasing Complexity



- Medical/behavior needs
 - Community animals instead of highly adoptable transfer animals
 - Existing behavior/medical issues that are difficult, expensive, timeintensive to resolve


Reduced capacity at partner and municipal agencies
