Liquor code inspections were conducted at 5 local businesses during the month of November. Minor violations were noted and resolved at the time of inspection.




DETECTIVE UNIT


Detective Brian Finley was assigned as the lead law enforcement investigator in the Prestwick Way explosives materials case. He has spent a significant










K-9 ACTIVITY: MONTHLY COMPARISON NOVEMBER 2015/2016




YEAR-TO-DATE COMPARISON NOVEMBER 2015/2016








TRAINING OVERVIEW




