## FROM THE DESK OF THE CRIME ANALYST

#### SHORTER DAYS AROUND THE CORNER

As fall continues and winter comes around the corner, the long days will become shorter and sunsets will begin earlier and earlier. Before you know it, it will be dark when you leave your office! Below are tips to keep in mind when arriving or leaving work as it gets dark and visibility gets low.

#### Low VISIBILITY TIPS

- Let someone know where you will be working and when you anticipate returning home.
  - » Make sure your family and friends know the work number where you can be reached.
  - » Call (or text) when you've reached your workstation and once again just before leaving for home.
- Take your cell phone with you they are effective in emergency situations to provide instant access to emergency services.
- Carry a loud whistle with you to alert someone if you are in danger or need help.
- Carry a small "pocket" flashlight in your purse, pocket or key ring so that you may see your path and vehicle better as it becomes darker.
- Try to park in well-lit areas and walk along lit walkways.
- Carry your keys and access cards in your hand when you are approaching doors, keeping them readily available.
  - » Make sure locked doors close and lock behind you.
- Keep your workstation or office locked after hours.
- When returning to your vehicle, watch for suspicious persons nearby and have your keys in your hand.
  - » Check the interior of your vehicle before getting in.
- Stay alert and aware of your surroundings.




#### **DETECTIVE UNIT**


On September 2, 2016, Douglas County Detective Dan Brite, assigned to the Douglas County Regional IMPACT Team, was critically injured by an individual who was actively firing weapons at citizens and law enforcement officers near Sierra Middle School in Parker. A number of law enforcement officers were involved in this exchange of gunfire. A use of force investigation was initiated by the 18th Judicial District's Critical Response Team (CRT). The purpose of the investigation

was to determine whether the use of force by law enforcement officers was justified under the Colorado Revised Statutes. Castle Rock Police Detective Mike Williams was selected as the Lead Investigator for the CRT investigative review.

We are pleased to report that Detective Brite survived his wounds and is recovering at a local medical facility. Our prayers go out to Detective Brite and his family for his complete and speedy recovery.




2014-2016 COMPARISON YEAR-TO-DATE: **SEPTEMBER**



Thank you, Sergeant Varela, for a job well done.









#### K-9 ACTIVITY: MONTHLY COMPARISON SEPTEMBER 2015/2016




#### EXPLORER UNIT SEPTEMBER 2015/2016



#### YEAR-TO-DATE COMPARISON 2015 YTD/ 2016 YTD








