
Open Space & Trails

MITCHELL CREEK CANYON TRAIL

Did you know several rock formations along Mitchell Creek Canyon Trail are ideal for bouldering? Bouldering is a non-technical form of free climbing performed close to the ground on small rock formations and rock walls. It's typically done without the use of ropes, harnesses, anchors and fixed hardware.

Thanks to volunteers from the Castle Rock and Denver Arc'Teryx stores, a new sustainable access route to the bouldering areas is available. In late October, in honor of National Public Lands Day, 16 volunteers joined the POST Partners Volunteer Program to build the access and close existing social trails. A new sign was also installed to mark the official route. Arc'Teryx staff have since expressed interest in adopting Mitchell Creek Canyon Trail for future trail building and community projects or special outdoor events.

National Public Lands Day is celebrated annually at public lands across the United States. A signature event of the National Environmental Education Foundation, it promotes both popular enjoyment and the volunteer conservation of shared public lands.





POST Partners Volunteer Program

2021 TRAIL MAINTENANCE

The POST Partners Volunteer Program organizes trail maintenance groups for the Town of Castle Rock - the Ridgeline Wranglers, the Rhyolite Dirt Crew and the Keepers of the Rock. Together, the volunteers of these organizations dedicate hundreds of labor hours each year to maintaining numerous soft-surface trails.

The Ridgeline Wranglers maintain and improve Stewart Trail at Ridgeline Open Space. The group has approximately 50 active members, with six trained crew leaders. This year, 115 volunteers dedicated 345 hours to maintain the trail corridor, as well as the trail bed. The group met on six Saturdays from spring to fall.

The Rhyolite Dirt Crew helps maintain and improve the bike park at Rhyolite Regional Park. This year, 76 volunteers dedicated 152 hours to build up berms and jumps for user safety. Volunteers also focused on weed management on a total of five volunteer outings.

The Keepers of the Rock is an all-volunteer group who adopted the Town's namesake Rock Park in 2004 with the hopes of making significant improvements to the area. These volunteers are in-tune with Rock Park's environment and are committed to sustaining the park for the enjoyment of the people who use it. The group conducts monthly restoration outings from April through November. Throughout 2021, 25 volunteers completed 50 hours of volunteerism to remove graffiti and clear trail corridors. Approximately 20 percent of the Keepers of the Rock workforce this year consisted of court-ordered service from the Town's Teen Court program. This mutual partnership seeks to instill a positive work ethic in and reduces the recidivism rates of the first-time juvenile offenders within the community.











Community Events

PIE BAKE OFF

The fifth annual Pie Bake Off event was held on Nov. 6 at the Millhouse at Philip S. Mark, experiencing delicious success! Over 30 people attended to cheer on 11 contestants. Pies were judged on appearance, pastry quality, filling quality and overall flavor. The competition was open to local bakers and a new youth category was also offered.

In the adult category, third place went to a Blueberry Earl Gray Pie; second place was awarded to a Caramel Pear Pie; and first place to Judy's Apple Pie. Katherine won the youth category with a Key Lime Pie.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, changes were incorporated in this year's event to accommodate social distancing and abide by State health guidelines. Tables were spaced 6-feet apart and guests were asked to wear masks when entering and moving around the event. Additionally, staff served the beverages and pie to attendees so no self-service was available.

U.S. adults say they spend some time outside every day.


Here are some more facts:


 Fifty-eight percent of U.S. adults spend more than 30 minutes a day outside

- Gen Z (9%) is more likely than adults overall (4%) to not go outside during the day

TEAM WELCOMES NEW ATHLETICS SUPERVISOR



Park Operations & Maintenance

NEW SYNTHETIC TURF INSTALLED AT BUTTERFIELD PARK

Identified as a priority in the Parks and Recreation Capital Improvement Plan, staff recently replaced the synthetic turf on the athletic field at Butterfield Park. The Town's General Fund provides funding for the replacement of large capital items such as turf, which is initially funded through growth but must be replaced using sales-tax based revenues. A 15-year replacement schedule is typically used for synthetic turf. Contractor Academy Sports Turf completed the project in November.

Over 42,000 square feet of new synthetic turf replaced the original turf, which was installed in 2005.
