



2016 Year End Report

WrapAround

As of Dec. 2016, we have received over 100 referrals, and have worked with 80 families, representing 200 individuals. WRAPs' conservative potential cost savings is, \$550, 000.-750,000*



*WRAP evaluates each family's involvement in 10 areas of importance. Average involvement is 60%. We estimate that services at the 60% rate, saves approximately \$11-15,000, per-family, to the community at large.


