# MOTOR VEHICLE THEFTS (MVT)

In 2015, CRPD had 43 reported stolen motor vehicle thefts (MVT) that excludes 12 trailer thefts. Of those 43 MVTs, 10 vehicles were left unlocked or unlocked with a key inside. This means that 23% of

stolen MVTs might have been prevented. Criminals like crimes of opportunity so please remember the tips below:

- Always lock your vehicle, this makes it harder for the criminal to steal.
- Never leave your key fob or spare keys inside or attached to your vehicle; the criminal will find it and use it to steal your vehicle.
- Never leave enticing objects in your car (purse, wallet, backpack, etc.). This creates an interest in your car and once inside they may decide to take your vehicle as well as your items.
- Do not leave your car running (puffing) while you're away from it. We understand it is Colorado and it is cold; but, it is illegal and makes for an easy steal.
- While parked, keep all windows closed. If they are slightly cracked a criminal can force entry.



#### **DETECTIVE UNIT**

The Detective Unit has seen a significant increase in crimes directed at children and teenagers through cellphone communications. This is a nationwide problem and of concern to the community and to law enforcement. The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children offers these tips for parents who are considering purchasing a

cellphone for their child.


- Establish rules for when they are allowed to use their cell phone, what websites they can visit, and what apps they can download.
- Review cell phone records for any unknown numbers and late night phone calls and texts.
- Remind your children that anything they send from their phones can be easily forwarded and shared.
- Teach your child never to reveal cell phone numbers or passwords online.
- Talk to your child about the possible consequences of sending sexually explicit or provocative images or text messages.
- When shopping for a cell phone for your child, research the security settings that are available.


# Crime Trend Comparison (3-month) NOVEMBER 2015 to JANUARY 2016





\*Assisted calls - Titan assisted the following agencies during the month of January 2016:




#### K-9 ACTIVITY: MONTHLY COMPARISON

(JANUARY 2015-2016 COMPARISON)












SECONDARY TRAFFIC DUTIES

CRPD stopped 1,159 suspected traffic violators in January and issued 373 tickets. The traffic enforcement resulted in approximately two thirds of drivers receiving warnings.

In January, the Traffic Unit applied for and received a Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) Mini-Speed Grant for \$4,950. Through this grant, a

TruCam Laser (LTI) was purchased for upgrades in speed detection. The new equipment provides photographs of suspected violators providing better evidence for apprehension and prosecution of speeding and other traffic violations. With this equipment, officers can provide more efficient traffic safety enforcement and plan to reduce time spent at court because of the new photo and video evidence.









■# OF SWORN ATTENDEES →AVG HOURS (per officer)
