



- DRE (Drug Recognition Expert) and instructor





3-YEAR CRIME TREND COMPARISON YEAR-TO-DATE: **OCT.** (2016-2018)




In October of 2018, Castle Rock Police Department Investigations Unit detectives reviewed an additional 146 case reports, along with their regularly scheduled caseload.




DETECTIVE UNIT CLEARANCE RATES COMPARISON OCT. (2016-2018)





OCT. YTD (2016-2018)






**EXPLORER UNIT


K9 UNIT




Officer Thompson and PSD Ronin









TRAINING OVERVIEW OCT. 2018



Colorado POST requires that all sworn peace officers complete a minimum of 24 hours of training annually. 75% of Castle Rock Police Officers have already met or have exceeded POST Rule 28 training hours.


A minimum of 12 hours must be completed in arrest control, firearms and driving. Training scheduled through the remainder of the year will bring all of our sworn officers into compliance with the POST requirements.





