CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATES *Parks, Open Space & Trails*

The updates below summarize the general progress that occurred throughout the month on capital projects managed through the Parks and Recreation Department; for background information and additional details visit CRgov.com/ProjectUpdates.

COLORADO FRONT RANGE TRAIL THROUGH CASTLE ROCK

The Colorado Front Range Trail in Castle Rock officially opened to the public in October with a festive grand opening event. Over 50 people attended to run a free 5K, enjoy complimentary refreshments and giveaways, and explore new geocaches and an Agents of Discovery mission hosted by the Castle Rock Parks and Trails Foundation. The new network provides a regional connection from Castle Rock to Denver through the Cherry Creek Regional Trail. Users can also travel from Cobblestone Ranch to Downtown Castle and further south to Lowell Ranch. The project was funded in part through a grant award from the Great Outdoors Colorado's Connect Initiative program, whose mission was to help partners fill gaps in networks across the state to provide safer, close-to-home recreation opportunities.

PLUM CREEK NEIGHBORHOOD PARK NAMING

Nearly 500 open-ended suggestions and 230 naming preferences were received through a questionnaire to gather public input to name the Town's next neighborhood park in Plum Creek. Among the suggestions and preferences, Emerald Park emerged as a top choice. A Town staff naming committee reviewed the input and recommended to the Parks and Recreation Commission that the park be named Emerald Park or a variant thereof. The commission unanimously supported this selection on Oct. 18, and Town Council approved a resolution to formally adopt Emerald Park as the name on Nov. 7. Site construction continues with grading and sanitary and storm utility installation. Once wet utilities are complete, the contractor will begin to put in electric and prep the site for concrete placement.

MITCHELL GULCH PARK RENOVATION PROJECT

Construction continues at Mitchell Gulch Park with efforts focused on assembling and installing site furnishings. The pour-in-place playground surfacing installation and the fine grading work are complete, along with the installation of park lights. The majority of landscaping and trees are also installed, except for a few varieties that are temperature dependent.

SLIDE TOWER STRUCTURE RENOVATION PROJECT

The Recreation Center's Leisure Pool will remain closed through mid-December to repair broken valves and allow contractors access above the area for the slide tower structure renovation project. Scaffolding was placed to work on the trusses and underside of the decking. Sections of the exterior slides were removed and interior demolition of the walls was also ongoing throughout October.


Parks Maintenance and Operations

This month the Parks Maintenance and Operations division spent


- 324 hours on holiday lighting;

PUBLIC ART STRATEGIC PLAN APPROVED BY TOWN COUNCIL

The Public Art Commission visioned and wrote a public art strategic plan to expand upon the vision and goals of previous Town art plans, while integrating the future dreams and aspirations of a growing community. The plan was formally adopted by Town Council on Nov. 7. The commission conducted community questionnaires, held on-the-street interviews with residents and visitors, completed stakeholder interviews with community leaders and local organizations and hosted a master planning workshop.
