CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATES

Parks, Open Space & Trails

The following updates summarize general progress that occurred throughout the month on capital projects managed through the Parks and Recreation department; for background information and additional details visit CRgov.com/ProjectUpdates.

LOST CANYON RANCH OPEN SPACE

The purchase of the spectacular Lost Canvon Ranch property is complete and is the largest one-time acquisition and protection of open space in the Town's history.

In late April, The Conservation Fund (TCF) officially purchased Lost Canyon Ranch and placed a permanent conservation easement on the open space through the Douglas Land Conservancy, which limits the uses going forward and preserves the natural state of the land. TCF then sold the property and associated groundwater rights to the Town on May 1, 2024. The total cost for Lost Canyon Ranch Open Space was approximately \$15 million.

Douglas County provided \$5.5 million from the Open Space, Parks and Historic Resources sales and use tax — which was extended with a nearly 80% approval rate by voters in 2022 — toward the acquisition of Lost Canyon Ranch.


GOCO provided the Town with a \$3 million Centennial Program award toward the purchase, marking the largest funding amount from GOCO for any project in Town history. The Centennial Program grant invests in high-value, once-in-a-generation visions and projects that will create lasting impacts for the Centennial State and future generations.

The Parks and Recreation Department will initiate a master planning process in 2024 to define the vision, goals and strategies for the use and management of the open space in alignment with the conservation values of the conservation easement. Residents will be invited to participate in the process which will help inform future public access to the open space.

MITCHELL GULCH PARK

Phase one of the park's renovation project was opened to the public. including the playground areas, the new plaza with seating, the fitcourse, cornhole and basketball court. Remaining work includes final landscaping around the courts and court surfacing, which are both dependent on consistent warmer temperatures.

The Town looks forward to celebrating and sharing the fully completed project with the community this summer, including the addition of the first-class tennis court facility that will be available for programmed and

Starburst Award

TWO RECENT PROJECTS NAMED 2024 STARBURST AWARD WINNERS BY THE COLORADO LOTTERY

The Town of Castle Rock was named winner of two 2024 Starburst Awards by the Colorado Lottery for two recent capital projects. One award recognized the Town's segments of the Colorado Front Range Trail, while the other celebrated its collaboration with the Meadows Metropolitan District No. 1 on But-terfield Crossing Park featuring Possibilities Playground.

This prestigious award recognizes commitment to excellence in utilizing Lottery funds for community and conservation projects. Winners are chosen based on a number of considerations including the creativity of the project, economic and social impact on the community, as well as the broader impact to Colorado. Read Colorado Lottery's description of both award-winning projects below:

- The Town's portion of the Colorado Front Range Trail is part of a statewide multi-use trail envisioned since 2003. The goal was to complete nearly five miles of new 10-foot-wide concrete trail, connecting Denver through southern Douglas County. This \$7 million project helped open a major recreational corridor and regional trail alternative, which now connects Castle Rock to Colorado Springs to Pueblo.
- Inclusivity is at the heart of the Butterfield Crossing Park featuring Possibilities Playground in Castle Rock. A total \$5.98 million project, the Town of Castle Rock created this vibrant and welcoming space that transcends the traditional barriers to access to outdoor play. Every feature was crafted to ensure that individuals of all abilities can fully engage and enjoy the park experience including wheelchair-accessible fitness courts, sensory walls with built-in tactile elements and American Sign Language (ASL) alphabets, a Roller-Table offering sensory stimulation through deep-muscle pressure, and the We-Go-Swing which promotes social interaction and provides visual and vestibular stimulation, including for those in wheelchairs.

Tiny Art Quest

PUBLIC ART COMMISSION LAUNCHES TINY ART QUEST

The Public Art Commission and Castle Rock Christian Academy partnered to launch the Tiny Art Quest. Part scavenger hunt, part miniart installation, the quest will feature tiny artworks by tiny artists in and around Festival Park. Once installed, those who look down and around will be rewarded with an outdoor show of miniature art in unexpected places in and around the heart of Downtown Castle Rock.


Parks Maintenance and Operations
