

INFORMED DELIVERY FROM USPS

The United States Postal Service (USPS) now offers a new feature allowing USPS customers to see what is being delivered to their mailbox *before* it is delivered. This new feature is called "Informed Delivery" and is a free service.

USPS customers may sign up at the post office or online: https://informeddelivery.usps.com

Once signed up, you will receive an email notification each morning with scanned images of the mail to be delivered to your mailbox that day. USPS created this service in hopes of reducing the risk of a number of issues, including mail theft.

Personally, I have signed up for the "Informed Delivery" service and have found it to be very useful. Now, when I am anticipating the delivery of certain bills, checks, or debit cards, I am made



aware that morning of what is being delivered to my mailbox. When I arrive home, I compare what was sent in the "Informed Delivery" message to what I actually received. If, for some reason, something doesn't match or I am missing an item, I can contact the USPS and notify them. I also have security cameras pointing at my mailbox, so if I suspect a mail theft took place, I review the images and send them to my local police department.

Take advantage of this free service! And remember, if you suspect packages or mail may have been stolen from your property, please contact Castle Rock Police Department or fill out an online police report!




YEAR-TO-DATE COMPARISON: MAY (2015 - 2017)

the abilities of the Castle Rock Police Department to respond to victims of child abuse, child sexual assault or children who are witnesses to serious crimes.






Liquor code inspections were conducted at three local businesses during the month of MAY. One minor violation was noted at one of the businesses and has been resolved.


