





**AUTUMN / WINTER HELPFUL TIPS** 


As we head into the autumn and winter months, please remember a few tips while there are extended hours of darkness:

- Park close to a light post or within a well lit area (this will help ensure you are not searching for your vehicle in the dark).
- Carry a small flashlight on a key ring or in a purse.
- Know your surroundings; this helps you notice any suspicious activity.
- Don't leave your car running unattended as it may be gone when you get back (even if you intend to leave for only a moment).
- Lock your vehicle and do not leave belongings inside. Vehicle trespasses are an easy way for thieves to steal all your belongings and possibly your identity.
- Leave outdoor lights on at your residence at night. Criminals are less likely to burglarize a home with sufficient outdoor lighting.
- Have your keys in hand when you approach your car or house; you will not be distracted by your keys and can pay attention to your surroundings.



# Property Intakes/Disposed 2014-2015 YTD





#### **DETECTIVE UNIT**


The Detective Unit investigated two unrelated armed robberies in the month of October. The first robbery occurred in the Lowe's parking lot during the evening hours of October 20. The suspects were three males from Aurora who

had arranged to meet the victim in the store's parking lot (through a social media site). The victim is from Colorado Springs. After meeting, the suspects produced handguns, 1750 forced the victim into a car. stole cash, and released the victim unharmed. The three suspects fled the area but were located a short time later by neighboring law enforcement officers along I-25. All three suspects were ultimately arrested and each are being held on \$500.000 bond while awaiting trial.

The second robbery occurred at the Check Into Cash store on Wilcox Street during the morning of October 28. The suspect produced a handgun and demanded cash before



fleeing the store in an unknown direction. The suspect was described as a black male, about 20 to 30 years of age, wearing jeans, a dark hoodie, an orange safety vest, light colored gloves, a white construction mask and was armed with a handgun. Detectives believe this crime may be associated with similar crimes occurring in the southern metropolitan area.




#### VICTIMS ASSISTANCE UNIT




OCTOBER 2014-2015 COMPARISON

- \*Training In-service training was provided to the Patrol Division regarding open area searches and the capabilities of the police service dogs (PSD).







#### Year-To-Date Comparison 2014/2015






