Thank you for the opportunity to request funding for 2016. The Town of Castle Rock has been a major supporter of the Youth Initiative and on behalf of those we serve, thank you for your loyal support.

As many of you are aware, the Youth Initiative is a major collaboration between seven Douglas County entities. It is truly the definition of partnership as we work together to serve our youth. The Town's contribution helps leverage each group's contribution. In addition to Castle Rock, we currently receive funding from the Town of Parker, City of Lone Tree, the Library District, the School District, Douglas County Government, and the Highlands Ranch Metro District. In 2015, we also received funds from: The Douglas County Department of Human Services, and received a grant from the State of Colorado helping pay for our juvenile justice work.
