




FROM THE DESK OF THE CRIME ANALYST

TAX FRAUDSTERS

With the beginning of tax season upon us, it is important for citizens to be aware of the various tactics that fraudsters will use in order to cash in on fraudulent tax returns and reap the rewards. Fraudsters obtain personal and financial information on their victims then use that information, along with forged documents, to file fraudulent tax returns and receive refunds. Below are some points to be aware of and ways to protect yourself and your identity during the tax season:







- Do not provide personal or financial information over the phone! Some fraudsters may attempt to obtain personal or financial information from you by spoofing phone numbers and calling you. They even pretend to be a financial organization such as the IRS.
 - » Note that the IRS will **never call or email you**. Any phone call claiming to be from the IRS is a **red flag** consider it a scam.
- If you receive phone calls requesting your information, beware of any sense of urgency in the phone call. If you are demanded to pay taxes right away or threatened with arrest, hang up the phone and do <u>not</u> provide any information or money to the suspect. This is a **common scare tactic** used by fraudsters.
- Do not think you are immune from fraudsters because "you never get a refund" or "you always end up owing money to the IRS." Fraudsters may still attempt to obtain your information, as they use it along with forged documents to ensure that a refund is received.

If you find that you are a tax fraud victim, here is what you can do:

- Contact the IRS immediately to notify them of the fraud. They will provide you with information and steps to take regarding forms and precautions.
- You likely will <u>not</u> be able to e-file your taxes, so plan on paper-filing your taxes and provide a statement as to why you are paper filing.
- Review your accounts and Online activity to see where the fraudster(s) may have obtained your information. Changing passwords is highly recommended in order to further protect yourself and your accounts.
- If you suspect someone is using your Social Security number, you can also contact the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) Identity Theft Hot-line toll-free at 1-877-438-4338.

Remember to contact Castle Rock Police Department, if you feel you have been a victim of identity theft.
















3-YEAR CRIME TREND COMPARISON YEAR-TO-DATE: **JANUARY** (2016-2018)



New Volunteer introduction: Lisa Kochevar completed the Victim Assistance Academy in




November 2017. She has been within the education field for the past eighteen years teaching political science.





YEAR-TO-DATE COMPARISON JANUARY (2016-2018)










TRAINING HOURS BY CATEGORY (AVERAGE PER OFFICER)


