Thank you for the opportunity to present our mid-year report. The Town of Castle Rock has been a major supporter of the Youth Initiative and on behalf of those we serve, we thank you for your support.

As many of you are aware, the Youth Initiative is a major collaboration between seven Douglas County entities. It is truly the definition of partnership as we all work together to serve our youth. The Town's contribution helps leverage each group's contribution. In addition to Castle Rock, we currently receive funding from the Town of Parker, City of Lone Tree, the Library District, the School District, Douglas County Government, and the Highlands Ranch Metro District.

With your annual contribution of \$19,800, The Youth Initiative provides numerous services and programs, reaching hundreds of County residents. As you will read, we added two new programs in 2015, a mentoring program and a program coordinating youth involved in the juvenile justice system.

## **DCYI Programs:**

1. Continue to serve families through the WrapAround program receiving referrals from the Castle Rock Police Dept., Castle Rock's Teen Court program, and the School District, among many others.

In 2015, we have so far received 90 referrals, with each Facilitator working with 10-12 families at any given time. We are on track to have more referrals than ever before.

## 2. Special Events:

The DCYI again hosted the Outstanding Youth Awards Event, recognizing students for their outstanding contributions, particularly under challenging circumstances. We also hosted the 7<sup>th</sup> Annual Youth Congress, and a popular lunch-n-learn series, offering community members educational lectures ranging from brain development, to negating negative behaviors in children, to reducing screen time for children under 12.



3. Continue to use our evaluation tool as we measure WrapAround's effectiveness and cost savings. In 2013, we drafted a tool to measure a child's risk factors when they enter the WRAP program.

Tool is used to capture risk factors and the associated cost savings relevant to each family worked with.

4. Research and connect with new funders in order to establish new lines of funding.

The Youth Initiative received a \$30,000 grant from the State of Colorado in 2015 to implement WrapAround for youth with serious mental health concerns.

5. Begin the process of collaborating and facilitating with other jurisdictions to implement Teen Court in two remaining areas of the County that do not provide the program.

DCYI, along with the County Manager's office, has met with: Castle Rock and Parker's Teen Court Coordinators, the DA's office and the City of Lone Tree to coordinate and implement Teen Court/Restorative Justice practices to non-served areas. We are working on expanding these services to assist families and juveniles involved in the juvenile justice system.
