



FROM THE DESK OF THE CRIME ANALYST

THEFTS FROM MOTOR VEHICLES

There have been many vehicles entered and broken into over the past several months, and the majority of these vehicles have been left *unlocked* with valuables inside. Help Castle Rock Police Department in deterring these crimes by:

- (1) Taking all valuables, such as cell phones, iPods, tablets, computers, wallets, keys, cash, credit cards, debit cards, checkbooks, and other personal documents *with* you when you are not in your vehicle.
- (2) Locking all doors and trunk of your vehicle and making sure your windows are rolled up.


Also, as a precaution, remember to inventory your personal property (i.e. iPods, cell phones, tablets, computers, sports equipment, etc.). **ReportIt** is a web-based tool that allows you to inventory your personal property and keep the information safe on a cloud-based format. This makes it easier for you to make claims with your insurance company if your property is taken, as well as makes it easier to account for your property in a police report.



YEAR-TO-DATE COMPARISON: **AUGUST** (2015-2017)




3-YEAR CRIME TREND COMPARISON YEAR-TO-DATE: **AUGUST** (2015-2017)







The Police Department's monthly Calls for Service (CFS) reflect the following Year-to-Date adjustments:


- 2016 to 2017 ↑ 134 CFS

- 2015 1,931 hours




BIKE UNIT MAY - AUGUST 2017

Dirt Jumps & Donuts - Aug. 17










TRAINING HOURS BY CATEGORY

AUGUST 2017






