





#### **VANDALISM TIPS**

Vandalism tends to increase in the summertime. Remember the below information in case you become a victim to vandalism:


- Work together as a neighborhood to keep an eye out for each other's property.


- Do not "post" that you will be out of town on social media; it makes you and your home an easy target for crime.


#### **DETECTIVE UNIT**

The Detective Unit has experienced a 21% increase in case assignments over this time last year and 87% over this time in 2013. Criminal filings have also increased by 27% over 2014 and 31% over 2013. Investments in personnel, resources and criminal analysis have enabled staff to keep pace with the workload and community demands for outstanding investigative services.


During June, we have seen increases in automobile thefts, trespasses to vehicles and associated crimes such as garage burglaries. Stolen personal items and vehicles from these recent crimes have been recovered in Colorado Springs and Lakewood. Frequently, these crimes occur in clusters and several neighbors are listed as victims in one police report.


These types of thefts are crimes of opportunity and typically occur during the nighttime hours in quiet residential neighborhoods. Residents are encouraged to lock their cars, keep their car windows up and keep garage doors closed.

One minor violation was noted at that business.




#### VICTIMS ASSISTANCE UNIT

The Castle Rock Police Department Victims Assistance (VA) Unit has been collaborating with the Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Parker Police and Lone Tree Police departments' VA Units to create an ongoing professional

relationship regarding mass disasters.

In the event there is a disaster in any of the above referenced jurisdictions, each VA Unit will be familiar with other advocates from these agencies.

Our first meeting took place on June 8, 2015 at the Parker Police Department. Debbie Boyle, VA from Douglas County Sheriff's Office, presented on the topic of CART - *Child Abduction Response Team*. After the presentation, an

exercise was completed providing all advocates an opportunity to work together. We are working to continue this collaboration by conducting joint meetings and trainings several times a year.

#### IN THE SPOTLIGHT

September 2014 was the last DEA Drug Take Back Initiative event. Our agency's commitment, along with the support of the community, collected 1,216 pounds of prescription medications over a 3-year period. That was medication kept out of the wrong hands and/or out of our water system.

We are now able to continue to

take back drugs all year long through a program overseen by the Colorado Department of Health and Environment. They have provided us with a drop box that is installed in our lobby and is available during our regular business hours of 8 am - 5pm.

#### Please remember

We accept: prescription medications, prescription ointments, prescription patches, vitamins, over-the-counter medications, and pet medications.

We cannot accept: liquids, needles, inhalers, radioactive medications, or aerosols.






#### CALLS FOR SERVICE






In June, Text to 911 went live for all Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) in Douglas County with the four major carriers. Texting to 9-1-1 provides accessibility to the hearing and speech impaired population and provides an alternative to reach help in dangerous situations when a voice call is not possible.

\*Enter the numbers "911" in the "To" field. The first text message should be brief and contain the location of emergency and type of help needed. Push the "Send" button. Keep messages brief and concise.
