

CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATES

Parks, Open Space & Trails

The following updates summarize general progress that occurred throughout the month on capital projects managed through the Parks and Recreation department; for background information and additional details visit CRgov.com/ProjectUpdates.

MITCHELL GULCH PARK GRAND REOPENING EVENT

Parks and Recreation staff hosted a grand reopening celebration on Wednesday, July 10 to recognize the completion of park renovations. The event featured summer luau fun, including a lei-making station, games, food trucks, music and more. Nestled in the Founders Village neighborhood in east Castle Rock for 27 years, the park was upgraded to improve accessibility, address life-cycle replacements and enhance park users' experience. Upgrades featured a new pavilion, all-season restrooms, a fitness area, two new playground areas, six tennis courts, new and expanded parking, a bike pump track and upgraded irrigation and lighting.



The Parks and Recreation Department is seeking public feedback to select a name for an east-west trail currently in design. The new segment will connect Philip S. Miller Park with Downtown Castle Rock through the proposed Brickyard and Miller's Landing developments. Project construction will commence in 2025. GOAT GRAZING COMMENCES FOR THIRD CONSECUTIVE YEAR

The Town has contracted Goat Green to provide 650 goats, two guard dogs, temporary electric fencing and water throughout July and August for preventative fire mitigation on public open space. Efforts will focus on removing brush and undergrowth to reduce vegetative fuels and control the spread of noxious weeds. The contractor started work at Metzler Family Open Space early July and will transfer the operation to Woodlands Bowl Open Space in early August.

EMERALD PARK

Colorado Designscapes continued construction efforts throughout July. The playground equipment was installed, and the contractor continues to work on pouring concrete and securing permitting for the restroom installation. Once a welding inspection of the pavilion is complete, painting will commence before its roof is placed.

EXPANDED ARTS PROGRAMMING LAUNCHING SOON

The Tri Arts Project is bringing expanded Arts and Enrichment offerings to the Cantril School in historic Downtown Castle Rock. Programs are available at all levels for adults and teens (ages 16+) in a wide range of mediums. Residents can tap into their creativity with classes in cooking, crafting and textiles, digital arts, drawing, literacy and writing, mosaics and collages, music and sound, painting, photography and film. The new programming begins in September, and registration is open now for all fall classes.

Acquired in 2023 and located in Downtown Castle Rock, the historic Cantril School is poised to become an arts and enrichment hub for the Town. With this partnership, TAP will work to bring artists, educators, students and community members together to make, teach, present and appreciate all forms of art. In addition, much of the arts and enrichment programming currently provided by the Parks and Recreation Department will move to Cantril School from the Castle Rock Recreation Center.

TWO SUMMER RACES WRAP UP

This summer the community came alive with energy and excitement as participants conquered Challenge Hill at Climb4Change and lit up the night sky during Pedal the Moon.

Climb4Change took place on Saturday, June 8 at Philip S. Miller Park. This unique racing event featured several timed races on the 200-step Challenge Hill, where participants ascended 178-feet across four different challenges. In addition to the races, there was a non-timed fun run/walk that families enjoyed at their own pace throughout the park. The event saw 150 registrants, and proceeds benefited the Town's Therapeutic Recreation program, which provides scholarships, purchases adaptive equipment, and offers activities for individuals with cognitive and physical disabilities.

Pedal the Moon, held on Saturday, July 20 brought families together for a glowing evening bike ride along the East Plum Creek Trail. Starting at either Castle View High School or Douglas County High School, participants rode approximately 6 miles on mostly flat terrain to Festival Park. The event featured a decorating station at the intersection of East Plum Creek and Hangman's Gulch trails, where riders could adorn their bikes with glow-in-the-dark items. Upon reaching Festival Park, participants enjoyed food, music, and glow giveaways under the light of the moon. The event attracted 198 registrations, and many families opted to ride back to their starting points after the festivities.


Parks Maintenance and Operations
