





SUMMERTIME TIPS

It's that time of year when the weather starts warming up and the sun shines longer making it ideal to enjoy a nice hike or day in the park. However, this is also a favorite time of year for criminals who want to take advantage of an easy target: *a vehicle left unattended with a purse inside.*

While you are out enjoying the lovely Colorado summer, Castle Rock Police Department wants to help keep you safe and alert. By following the tips listed below, you can assist in keeping your belongings safe and deter criminals from targeting your vehicle while it's parked at a trailhead or park.

- Do not leave your purse in your vehicle, even if it is hidden under a seat. Take your purse or wallet with you while you hike, or lock your purse in the trunk of your vehicle where it cannot be seen.
- If you would rather not carry your purse or wallet, then only take the items that are necessary for your trip (driver's license, credit/debit card, insurance). Keep these items in a secure pocket on your person, or better yet, pack a backpack and keep these items with your water and snacks.
- If you do not need it, leave your checkbook at home. Criminals favor checkbooks and credit cards, as they are easy to use fraudulently.
- If you see any suspicious activity in the parking lots — people looking into windows, wandering between vehicles for an extended amount of time, etc.— report the activity to Castle Rock Police Department.




DETECTIVE UNIT

(2016-2018)




3-YEAR CRIME TREND COMPARISON YEAR-TO-DATE: **APRIL**

DETECTIVE UNIT CLEARANCE RATES COMPARISON APRIL (2016-2018)








Debbie Lewis is pleased to announce that the VAU's request for funding




PROPERTY & EVIDENCE STATISTICS

Demonstrations - Officer Thompson and Ronin conducted one demonstration for a second grade class.





YEAR-TO-DATE COMPARISON APRIL (2016-2018)






CALLS FOR SERVICE APRIL (2016-2018)




EXPLORER UNIT APRIL (2016-2018)




TOTAL TRAFFIC STOPS (2016-2018)






TRAINING HOURS BY CATEGORY

APRIL 2018






I just want to thank Officer D. Knight, and K. DeClaire, for their assistance. They made a scary situation better, and gave peace of mind to me and my daughter. He helped get us out of harms way on the highway, and to a tire store, safely. Thank you very much for your time, patience, and commitment!!
