

### **ENSURE OUTSTANDING PUBLIC SAFETY**



Requesting a 0.2% sales tax increase to generate an estimated \$3.75 million annually to fund 40 public safety positions over the next five years, including these in 2025:

- 10 Fire and Rescue positions nine firefighter/paramedics to place a fourth ambulance into service and one apparatus mechanic
- 11 Police positions two school resource officers, one patrol sergeant and four patrol officers, a detective, an Animal Control supervisor, a traffic officer and a dispatcher

## **ENSURE OUTSTANDING PUBLIC SAFETY**

- Fund \$6.3 million toward the construction of Fire Station 156; this is not the full amount needed – COPs will likely need to be issued to fund the full cost
- Fund replacement AEDs at all Town facilities and Investigations office space at CRPD, for a total cost of \$435,000
- Police and Fire merit step program provides 7.5% increase for sworn personnel moving to top of range
  - Retirement costs for Police 11.25%; for Fire, retirement costs go from 13.5% in 2025 to 15.5% in 2029
- Range movement of 2%, with non-public safety employees eligible for up to 5% merit increase

## **ENHANCE OUR ROADS**



- Continue construction of Crystal Valley interchange
- Crowfoot Valley Road improvements northeast of Knobcone Drive
- Pavement Maintenance Program concentrated in central Castle Rock funding challenges to keep up with needs
  - Proposed 2025 Budget continues shift in sales tax allocation toward public safety with reduction in PMP
- Acquire right of way and begin construction to widen Fifth Street and begin constructing the first of two phases of improvements; and acquire right of way for Wolfensberger Road widening

## MAINTAIN STRONG PARKS AND RECREATION



- Pending Town Council approval, begin construction of a new sports development center; funding would require an amendment to the 2025 Budget
- Complete the master plan for Lost Canyon Ranch Open Space
- Complete renovations at Centennial Park, offering new tennis and basketball courts, improved accessibility and parking and expanded seating options
- Complete construction drawings and obtain approvals for a trail to connect Philip S. Miller Park to Downtown Castle Rock along Industrial Tributary

## MAINTAIN STRONG PARKS AND RECREATION (7)



- Update the free weight and circuit equipment, along with the sand filters for the lap pool, at the Recreation Center
- Add an Administrative Assistant position, using proceeds of the Town's voterapproved lodging tax
- Improve the irrigation system at Red Hawk Ridge Golf Course

## SUPPORT ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT



Fulfill existing economic incentive agreements and allow capacity for new incentive agreements

## MANAGE TOWN FINANCES CONSERVATIVELY

- International Internation
- To ensure they are used only in the manner approved by voters, receive any "excess"
   TABOR revenues into a dedicated fund

- Town property tax mill levy expected to remain 0.92 mills \$37.50 for median home

## MANAGE TOWN FINANCES CONSERVATIVELY

- Continue monitoring revenues within the Development Services Enterprise Fund –
  which operates as a self-supporting enterprise, relying upon development fees to pay for
  associated Town costs to ensure solvency amid lower levels of development
- Comply with new gas-powered equipment regulation, prohibiting the use of leaf blowers, string trimmers, chainsaws and other equipment during June, July and August
  - Staff estimates the Town needs to replace nearly 90 pieces of equipment at an
    estimated cost of over \$300,000 and is seeking to minimize the budget impact by
    using a \$126,840 Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant, funded through
    the Federal Department of Energy, toward the replacements

## SECURE OUR WATER FUTURE



- Overall rate increase of 4%, system development charges increase as well
- Long-term water projects planned in 2025 include expansion of the Plum Creek Water Purification
  Facility; continued progress on the WISE, Box Elder, Cherry Creek Authority and Chatfield Reallocation
  projects; and completion of the new reservoirs near Sedalia
- Continue to implement advanced metering infrastructure and upgrade pumping and control system equipment
- Redesign and reconstruct the Plum Creek Diversion to maximize permitted capacity
- Rehabilitate and replace aging water and sewer infrastructure on Front Street going into Downtown and the Young/American neighborhood
- Implement the U.S. Highway 85 sewer project using Douglas County American Rescue Plan Act funds
- Stabilize stream segments in Sellers Gulch, improve detention ponds, rehabilitate aging storm sewer pipe and update the Watershed Master Plan

## OTHER ITEMS & ISSUES OF NOTE

- Fund employee compensation at an average 5% performance-based increase for general employees, with an average of 7.5% budgeted for public safety personnel
- Implement health plan premium increases of 5% for both the Town and employees
- If the ballot measure is successful, place \$200,000 from any available Town revenues into the Public Art Fund annually, along with a one-time contribution of \$100,000 from Town lodging tax revenues, for the purpose of funding public art programs as approved by Town Council
- Per 2024 Town Council direction, establish a Youth Commission for the Town with a paid staff position
