

CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATES

Parks, Open Space & Trails



COLORADO FRONT RANGE TRAIL THROUGH CASTLE ROCK

Concrete placement was completed and backfill and seeding commenced. A grand opening event will be held from 9 to 11 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 14 at Cobblestone Ranch Park, All are welcome to mark this significant milestone with a ribbon-cutting, free 5K run, complimentary refreshments and giveaways, an Agents of Discovery mission hosted by the Castle Rock Parks and Trails Foundation and hunting for newly placed geocaches along the trail. Staff will also soon seek Town Council support to finalize the \$2 million grant award through an agreement with Great Outdoors Colorado, marking the completion of the project. INDUSTRIAL TRIBUTARY TRAIL

Town Council approved an agreement with Wilson & Company, Inc., Engineering and Architects to design the Town's portion of the Industrial Tributary Trail. The project will link Philip S. Miller Park at Plum Creek Parkway to Downtown Castle Rock. The Town's portion will construct .3 miles of 10-footwide paved trail under Prairie Hawk Drive and the BNSF railroad, and link users to the existing East Plum Creek Trail via a pedestrian bridge over the creek. The Miller's Landing and Brickyard developments will separately fund and construct the first .7 miles of trail from the underpass at Plum Creek Parkway to Prairie Hawk Drive. Design engineering is expected to be completed in fall 2024, with construction commencing and concluding in 2025.

CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATES

MITCHELL GULCH PARK RENOVATION PROJECT

Parking lot and entry drive paving were completed while shelter installation and site grading continues. Post tension concrete slabs will soon be placed for the tennis courts.



PLUM CREEK NORTH NEIGHBORHOOD PARK

Demolition of the existing amenities commenced and Russian olive mitigation was underway. The project contractor is also obtaining pricing on removing and replacing the existing parking lot, as opposed to milling over the lot, due to the extensiveness of damage present.



LIGHTING UPGRADES

Solar-powered LED lights were recently installed in the parking lots of Metzler Family and Gateway Mesa open spaces, as well as at Rock Park. The lights will improve visitor safety while simultaneously maximizing energy efficiency.



FITNESS PROGRAMMING UPDATES

BLUEBIRD PROJECT

Summary

2023 Colorado Bluebird Project

ANNUAL VOLUNTEER EFFORT WRAPS UP

Each year, volunteers monitor bluebird populations through the Town's Post Partners Volunteer Program under the guidance of the Denver Audubon Society. The mission of the Colorado Bluebird Project is to improve the vitality of bluebirds throughout the state and to inform and education the public.

Bluebirds are social migratory songbirds, and, as second cavity nesters, rely on other species' used nest cavities or artificial nest boxes during their annual mating season. The POST Partners volunteer program managed 202 artificial boxes at 34 school, park, open space, cemetery and church sites in Castle Rock this year. Volunteers of all ages assist with annual maintenance and repair, as well as monitor fledgling success rates from April through August.

The 2023 season wrapped up in August. Six native bird species used Castle Rock's nest boxes including Mountain and Western Bluebirds; Violet-green, Tree Swallows, Black-capped and Mountain Chickadees.



In its 17th year of data collection, bird activity saw a rebound from the last few years with 732 total fledglings. 2022 saw 665 total fledglings and 2021 saw 531 total fledglings. Of note, Castle Rock saw its highest number of Violet-green Swallow nests since 2019, one at Metzler Family Open Space and one at Matney Park.

A few factors contributed to a challenging year for some of the young. One hundred and ten eggs went unhatched, likely a result of cold, wet weather in May and June. There were 809 total young, but only 732 fledged, so there was a loss of 77 chicks that hatched but never fledged likely due to predation, disappearance for unknown reasons or inability to survive cold, wet spring weather. Lastly, two House Sparrow nests were confirmed, one at Butterfield Park and one at Matney Park. House Sparrows are non-native and aggressive, competitive species to bluebirds. They have infrequently nested in Castle Rock boxes over the years.


VEHICLE COUNTER
