2021 Election Results

In response to the results of the November 2021 election, certain modifications to the 2022 Budget from first reading are recommended:

- Removal of the New Housing Construction Tax Fund and the Open Space Tax Fund from the budget
- Reductions in the five-year financial plan
- Removal of staff positions for several internal Town services: Innovation and Technology, Town
 Attorney's Office and Facilities
- Removal of out-year public safety positions these positions will remain a priority as resources allow – more later on this
- Putting resources on priorities
- Reduction of Town employer funding to the Employee Benefits Fund (7% increase versus 8% planned increase)

Modifications to Budget on Second Reading

These reductions allow for the following:

- Full funding of enhanced police and fire compensation plan
- Four new police officers for Patrol (over-hire for police in January 2022)
- Four new firefighter/paramedic positions

(Dispatcher, Police Sergeant, Emergency Manager, Fire Office Assistant and two Fire Educators not funded in 2022)





Public open house and listening sessions seeking public input on funding additional positions for Police and Fire

Voter adoption of 2D: 10-year timeout from TABOR restrictions – requiring excess revenue for police, fire and roads targets our priority funding

With strong sales tax continuing, a likely 2021 TABOR surplus will allow for additional funding of Police and Fire positions for the 2023 Budget

Continued funding of enhanced police and fire compensation plan

Going Forward

- Annual growth in sales tax revenue budgeted at 4.5%.
- Property tax revenue budgeted at an increase of 5.5%
 - Mill levy rate will be 1.139 mills
- A slight decrease to current water rates and fees for existing customers is proposed
- An increase to the maximum-allowed amount for growth-related water system development fees along with inflationary increases for all other development impact fees as previously approved by Council is planned
- Continued strong residential growth: 800 single-family units, 220 multifamily units and ~150,000 square feet of commercial development
- Proposed Townwide budget is \$302.1 million
 - Includes \$142.6 million for capital improvements; \$20.7 million for debt, interfund loans and transfers between funds; and \$138.7 million for operations, including \$18.5 million for annual pavement maintenance
- Expected revenues are \$257.5 million
 - The difference between expected revenues and expenditures is attributable to the planned use of \$44.6 million in capital reserves, which is a common and sound practice
 - Proposed 2022 operating budget is 8.3% greater than the 2021 operating budget of \$127.9 million.
 - This increase reflects planned investments in Town operations –
 enabled by the four ballot questions to meet our growing community's
 needs and service expectations

Castle Rock residents and visitors love our Gold Medal-winning parks and recreation system. Older parks age and need additional maintenance and refurbishment. As new Parks and Recreation locations come online, they require maintenance as well. Whether replacing dormant trees and vegetation, updating parks or improving entryways into Town, additional resources are needed to keep Castle Rock special.

Parks & Rec projects in the five-year plan:

\$17,500,000 towards a new recreation center

\$7,200,000 for trail improvements, including completion of the

Castle Rock portion of the Front Trange Trail

\$4,950,000 for the next new park - location TBD

\$4,500,000 for other park improvements

Annual Pavement Maintenance Program: \$72.2M 2022-2026

2022: \$18.5 million for southern Castle Rock 2025: \$13.5 million for central Castle Rock 2023: \$12.4 million for eastern Castle Rock 2026: \$14.5 million for northern Castle Rock

2024: \$13.3 million for western Castle Rock

Proposed funding for each area is based upon projected needs.

Improving operations

- Funding to enhance traffic signal and street light maintenance would increase \$47,300 to \$132,000 annually
- Wayfinding signs would be added Downtown in 2022, and illuminated street name signs would be added to existing traffic signals along Meadows Parkway at U.S. Highway 85 in 2022 and at Factory Shops Boulevard in 2023
- \$100,000 would be budgeted annually for studies to help improve traffic safety

- Prairie Hawk Drive widening between Wolfensberger Road and Melting Snow Way
- Plum Creek Parkway widening from Wolfensberger Road to the Miller Activity Complex entrance
- Interstate 25 and Plum Creek Parkway southbound off-ramp construction



Town Property Tax Mill Levy History

Second reading of the Town's property tax mill levy ordinance is based on final assessed valuation

2021 final valuation is \$1,302,055,442 - an increase of 10.8%

After applying the Town's 5.5% property tax growth limit, the Town's levy will reduce to 1.139 mills



Property Tax Mill Levy

Adoption on first reading for the 2022 Budget and 2022 mill levy ordinance occurred on September 21, 2021.
