LAWN PASSES NOW AVAILABLE

Get access to concerts all summer long with a Summer Concert Series Lawn Pass. A limited number are now available for purchase prior to the lineup announcement on April 15. Parks & Recreation Facilities

PERMIT AND RENTAL OPTIONS FOR COMMERCIAL AND PRIVATE FACILITY USE

Warmer weather is around the corner and more people venture outside to enjoy the Town's beautiful parks, open space and well-maintained recreation facilities. Vendors and patrons requiring special use should be aware of the Town's permit and rental agreement options to properly provide services.

COMMERCIAL ACTIVITIES

All commercial activities or services in Town parks that provide a benefit to an individual, group or organization require a permit. The Commercial Activity Permit provides licensed vendors the opportunity to sell food, nonalcoholic beverages and other services and goods at designated sites approved by the department. Some examples include mobile food vendors, dog training, boot camps, running clubs, music classes and fitness classes. Permits also ensure there are no conflicts with planned maintenance during the use of park facilities and that adequate insurance coverage is in place.

Filming and photography for commercial purposes on public property or in parks also requires a permit. Applicants must complete a permit application at least five days prior to the shoot.

SPECIAL EVENT PERMITS

Events hosting 50 people or more in any public Town location require a special events permit. Please review the special events information available at CRgov.com/SpecialEvents under the "plan an event" tab. The first step for any event organizer is to fill out an application. Applications are then reviewed and event organizers are notified within two weeks regarding the status of their application and next steps.

FIELD AND ATHLETIC RENTALS

The Parks and Recreation Department has more than 15 outdoor facilities, featuring fields, tennis courts, inline courts and trails that are available for rent. For more information and to make reservations, visit CRgov.com/AthleticRental.

FACILITY AND VENUE RENTALS

Some Parks and Recreation venues are available for rent to individuals or outside groups for special events, meetings, races, weddings, concerts and other gatherings. Facilities include park pavilions, meeting/party rooms at the Miller Activity Complex and Recreation Center and The Millhouse at Philip S. Miller Park. STAFF USE INNOVATIVE RECRUITMENT TECHNIQUES TO PREP FOR SUMMER

As the department gears up for summer, many programs require a long lead-time in the hiring process to account for comprehensive background checks and certifications. Statelicensed day camps require that staff meet state standards related to education and pass multiple background checks,

which can take up to four months to fully complete. Lifeguards must pass training and obtain first aid and CPR certifications.

Throughout March and into April, recruitment has been underway to ensure the department is in a position to successfully offer its recreation services to the community. One innovative approach is that staff have hosted a series of instant hiring



events, where interested candidates can show up during open hours on select dates. Interviews and job offers are completed on-the-spot, conditional on the satisfactory completion of a background check. From five events held in March and early April, 30 interviews were completed and a total of 18 job offers extended for Camp Counselor and Aquatics positions.

To further assist with retention and recruitment efforts, the department has increased the starting level of pay, implemented equity adjustments for current staff by \$1 per hour, adjusted scheduling practices to better accommodate staff needs and launched a \$100 gift card referral program for current staff who refer individuals who are eventually hired.



Red Hawk Ridge Golf Course

TOWN COUNCIL APPROVES PURCHASE OF NEW MAINTENANCE EQUIPMENT

Since 1999, Red Hawk Ridge Golf Course has prided itself for having outstanding playing conditions featuring beautifully manicured greens. To continue to provide this first-class playing experience, staff recently sought Town Council approval of a resolution for an acquisition agreement to purchase new maintenance equipment.

The course's current fleet is five to 25 years old and the equipment with the heaviest use is in need of replacement. Replacing the equipment prior to failure helps prevent a compromise to course quality resulting from a breakdown, ensures the efficiency of maintenance staff and reduces repair and maintenance costs.

Staff elected to use the Colorado Multiple Assembly of Procurement Officials (MAPO) pricing from the L.L. Johnson Distributing Company to ensure that pricing was competitively bid. Staff then reviewed financing options from L.L. Johsnon, Wells Fargo Equipment Finance and an interfund loan with the Town of Castle Rock to save issuance costs and provide a lower interest rate. The Town had the most attractive rate and terms. The Town's General Fund shall deposit to the Golf Fund a loan amount of \$541,816 for the purchase. Red Hawk Ridge Golf Course is an Enterprise Fund, so these operational costs will be paid through golf revenue and taxpayer dollars will not be used.

- Three Toro Greensmaster 3150-Q Greens mower | Replaces 12-year-old equipment

- One Toro Groundsmaster 4500 rough mower | Replaces 12-year old equipment
- OneGreenPro 1260 greens roller
 | Replaces 12-year old equipment
- Two Toro Reelmaster 5410-D Fairway mower | Replaces 7-yearold equipment
- One Toro ProCore 864 Fairway Aerator | Allows staff to core cultivate twice as fast
- One Toro Bullseye QuickGroom 550 | Allows staff to top dress more efficiently
- One First Products VC60 3-PT tractor mount Vericutter | Allows staff to dethatch turf
