Dreams came true and wishes were granted for the Therapeutic Recreation Division on Saturday, April 23 at this year's Dreams Come True Prom for individuals with disabilities who are ages 14 and up.

This annual event, put on in partnership between the division and Wellspring Community, was held at Castle View High School and delivered a magical evening for 76 adolescents and adults with disabilities. Guests were able to take part in a prom experience for all ability levels and at no cost to families.

Due to generous sponsorships from Developmental Pathways and Chick-Fil-A, guests were provided the opportunity to be the star of the show and to engage in a variety of activities and elements. These included walking the red carpet, riding the Town of Castle Rock trolley, interacting with character actors/ actresses, taking keepsake photos in the photo booth, dancing the night away, and being crowned individually as prom royalty. This event was able to be held in a supportive and encouraging environment through the dedication of over 100 volunteers, who amassed a total of 434 hours to the project as prom buddies, decorating crew members, check-in support, trolley and welcoming hosts and food service assistants.

CONSTRUCTION TO COMMENCE FOR BUTTERFIELD PARK RENOVATION

In April, Town Council approved a construction contract with American Civil Constructors to renovate Butterfield Crossing Park, which has been home to swim meets, sports practices and cherished community events since 1986.

Construction will commence this spring and the final project is planned for completion in early 2023. Upgraded amenities are to include new basketball and pickleball courts, improved gathering spaces, improved accessibility and lighting, upgraded irrigation, new walking paths and a fitness court.

During the planning and visioning phases of this renovation project, public feedback demonstrated a collectively strong desire to not only renovate the park but to create a playground that would serve everyone. The Possibilities Playground will offer play elements and amenities for anyone to engage with and will create a space that removes barriers so all can participate together in an inclusive environment.

The Castle Rock Parks and Trails Foundation is raising money to help fund the playground in its entirety. Features will include musical instruments to stimulate senses; a slide that prevents static shock to those with cochlear implants; a merry-go-round, swings and zip lines that can accommodate wheelchairs; a sensory wall with a variety of textures and colors; and more! The pool and the athletic fields will remain open throughout construction. The plaza area will remain open to the greatest extent possible, as well as the walkway connection with Meadow View Elementary until school closes for the summer. Parking availability will also be limited.

PHILIP S. MILLER PARK PLAY LOOP UPDATES TO INCREASE PLAY AND IMPROVE TRAIL ACCESS

The Town of Castle Rock is adding a sidewalk along the existing unpaved path that will provide an accessible looped connection between the parking area, aerial trekking course and adventure playground at Philip S. Miller Park. The portable restrooms will be relocated out of the parking lot to improve safety and free up seven spaces for parking as part of the project. Curb and gutter will be installed on the far end of the parking lot and the trailhead will be relocated and formalized to improve access to park trails. Three new play features will be added along the new route, expanding the play experience at the adventure playground. The project is funded through lease fees paid by the Edge Ziplines and Adventures. Construction will commence the last week of April and is scheduled to be complete by summer 2022.

126 VOLUNTEERS RESTORE CREEK BANKS IN HONOR OF EARTH DAY

On Saturday, April 16, over one hundred volunteers helped to stabilize the banks of the East Plum Creek.

For more than a decade, volunteers have helped the Town celebrate Earth Day by restoring disturbed areas along waterways. This year, three teams harvested and planted willows for this conservation project established in honor of earth day.

Volunteers first took cuttings from mature willows and then planted the cuttings along the of the East Plum Creek Trail south of East Plum Creek Parkway and north of Crystal Valley Parkway.

As the new plantings get established, they will contribute to a robust riparian habitat that prevents stream bank erosion, helps to filter pollution, reduces impacts from flooding and provides shelter for animals.

FREE SPRING PROGRAMMING OFFERS INFORMATION ABOUT CASTLE ROCK'S WILD SIDE

How can you protect small pets from coyotes? Are there really rattlesnakes on the trails? What do you do if you see a bear in your neighborhood? Staff set out to answer these questions and more every spring through free educational programming.

On April 27, residents experienced real wildlife displays and learned about local animals at Wild in Our Town. Douglas County Open Space and Colorado Parks and Wildlife were also present to help answer questions about coyotes, bears, deer, mountain lions, bobcats, rattlesnakes, prairie dogs, beavers and turkeys. Following the open question and answer segment, representatives presented interesting wildlife facts.

The public can also learn about birds native to Castle Rock at three birdwatching classes. Basics of Bird Watching is for beginners and was held Wednesday, May 4. Attendees learned about bird identification, choosing and using binoculars, field guides and where to find the best birding spots.

A guided birdwatching walk will be offered on Saturday, May 14 along the East Plum Creek Trail and a guided hike on Wednesday, May 18 at Gateway Mesa Open Space. The walk and hike are designed to advance birding skills learned during the Basics of Birdwatching class, but attending the indoor class is not required to participate. GEMSTONE TURF REPLACEMENT PROJECT

Throughout April, contractor Academy Sports Turf installed new synthetic turf at the athletic field at Gemstone Park. This athletic field was one of the first installed in Castle Rock in 2006 and has been widely used for a variety of sports being conveniently located off of Crow Foot Valley Road near Founders Parkway.

The project was part of the repair and replacement program identified annually through the Town's budget and capital improvement planning process. The synthetic turf had already outlived its 10-year lifespan having been in place for 16 years. Academy replaced 57,000 square feet in April and staff anticipate repurposing the old turf for a variety of projects as needed.

The replacement was funded through the General Long Term Planning Fund and Town Council authorized expenditures of up to \$292,000 plus a Town-managed contingency by resolution in April.
