Recreation Facilities

PROPOSED SPORTS DEVELOPMENT CENTER AND PARTNERSHIP

On May 17, Town Council directed Parks and Recreation staff to continue discussions and obtain public input on a proposed sports development center.

Since 1986, the Town of Castle Rock has thoughtfully planned, implemented and maintained public recreation facilities supporting active lifestyles, health and wellness, youth development and multi-generational social interaction. The Town has not constructed a new gymnasium or competitive pool, however, since 1988 when the population was only 9,000 residents and there is now a very high demand for indoor facility space. The Parks and Recreation Master Plan, Strategic Plan and the Indoor Recreation Feasibility Study support the development of a new indoor recreation facility.

Since available Town-owned sites for a facility are limited to mostly residential areas, staff issued a Request for Proposals to assess potential partnership opportunities for land since the available budget does not include property acquisition. Confluence Companies submitted a proposal to provide land, financing and construction services. The facility would sit within their proposed project site called the Brickyard off of Prairie Hawk Drive. The Brickyard could feature mixed-use development and clean up a blighted industrial property in central Castle Rock, adjacent to I-25.

The proposed sports development center could complement the youth-oriented Miller Activity Complex and traditional recreation options available at the Castle Rock Community Recreation Center. The first phase is proposed to include five indoor courts, a 25x25 meter competition pool, a 3-4 lane warm-up pool, spectator seating, an indoor adventure track, fitness and sports training areas, meeting and team rooms, and locker rooms. The center could also accommodate a second future phase once funding is available.

The Town funds new parks and indoor facilities using an impact fee charged to new development under the adopted philosophy that growth should pay for the impacts created by growth. The Parks and Recreation Capital Fund generates revenues through fees charged on new residential building permits. The expenditure of impact fees is limited to funding the development of new parks, indoor recreation facilities and outdoor pools and cannot be used for other services such as roads or public safety.

The Town is now seeking resident input on the proposal. An open house was held from 4 to 6 p.m. on Tuesday, June 14. Over 50 attended the open house at The Millhouse at Philip S. Miller Park. Residents are also encouraged to provide feedback through an online survey available at CRgov.com/NewRecFacility.

Staff plan to provide Town Council with an update on the feedback received from the open house and survey and seek future direction in July. If the project is approved, construction could commence as soon as 2023, with the facility opening in 2025.

COBBLESTONE RANCH PARK SET TO OPEN JUNE 29

Come one, come all to the big show at Cobblestone Ranch Park. After months of work, construction is nearing completion and the park will open with a bang. Don't miss the big-top celebration from 5 to 8 p.m., Wednesday, June 29.

The first phase of the regional park project features a 12-acre neighborhood park along Castle Oaks and Arabella drives. Picnic areas, a large playground, a pump track for biking, half-court for basketball, six pickleball courts, a great lawn, sidewalks, a plumbed restroom and off-street parking will soon be available for public use. The full master plan for the 168-acre regional park is available online and the site will eventually serve as a regional destination, much like Philip S. Miller Park.

"We're really grateful for residents' involvement in planning this new park," said Councilmember Laura Cavey. "Their input helped created some exciting amenities for the entire northeast area of Castle Rock. Plus, the combination of natural resources, park development and trail connections, will make Cobblestone Ranch Park a draw for the entire community."



The grand opening celebration is set to include carnival games, aerial performers, stilt walkers, snow cones, live music, a fun 5K and more. Registration for the fun 5K is required. Registration and more information is available at CRgov.com/CobblestoneRanchPark.

ALLTRAILS PARTNERSHIP

The Parks and Recreation Department has launched an exciting pilot project with AllTrails to beta test the use of QR codes installed at trailheads. The pilot aims to assess the value and practical application of the codes as a tool for enhanced public engagement.

Temporary signs with the QR codes were placed at Rock Park and Gateway Mesa Open Space. Once scanned, trail users can learn about the trail such as available distance options, difficulty levels and current conditions. Users can also leave feedback and stay connected. The signs will remain throughout 2022 and staff will work with AllTrails to track usage and consider continued and expanded implementation.
