

INTERNET SAFETY

TIPS & REMINDERS:

These days everyone has access to so many different electronics that lead them right to the Internet. Here are some helpful tips to keep in mind.

- Don't give out personal information about yourself or your family (address, phone number, parent's work information, school's information, etc.)
- When creating a screen name, do not use personal information like your last name or date of birth.
- Do not share your passwords.
- Not everything you read online is true.
- Not everyone may be who they say they are or the age their profile says in chat rooms.
- If you agree to meet with someone you met online, meet them in a public place and bring along a parent or friend.
 - » You can also use the Castle Rock Police Department's lobby or their vestibule area (24/7) as a Safe Transaction Zone to meet people during selling or buying from online sites.
- Don't send or respond to mean or harassing messages.
- Don't post photos or videos that are inappropriate.
- Do not open emails or files from people you don't know as they may contain a virus.
- Remember, anything that is posted on the Internet is there forever (e.g. pictures, statuses). Even if you delete these items, they still exist in the Internet world.


DETECTIVE UNIT



3-YEAR CRIME TREND COMPARISON YEAR-TO-DATE: JULY




2014-2016 COMPARISON YEAR-TO-DATE: JULY




LIQUOR ENFORCEMENT


Notes of interest:

- *Note Officer Thompson and Ronin continue on light duty.



The Explorer Unit participated in the following JULY events:


- LEEPAAC Regional Conference in Gunnison, CO










TRAINING HOURS BY CATEGORY (AVERAGE PER OFFICER) **JULY 2016**
