We hope you enjoy reviewing this request and learning about the many projects and programs of the Youth Initiative. If you have questions, please contact us any time.



DCYI EVENTS:

Outstanding Youth Awards

Each April, DCYI selects 10 outstanding youth who have overcome personal adversity and created positive change in their lives. The awards program provides business, community and civic leaders an opportunity to actively demonstrate their belief in, and support for, young people in our community. In 2017, three out of the 10 selected were from Castle Rock!





Youth Congress

Each Fall, students are invited to work with community members and elected officials in a Youth Congress allowing them the opportunity to share their ideas and give feedback. Participants work on policy development and make presentations on their findings. Held at the State Capitol, 9-12 graders hear from subject matter experts on a variety of issues, and then tackle these complicated problems. From unifying the teen curfew, to working on the prevention of bullying, they learn how challenging it is to write policy.

Educational Series

DCYI hosts quarterly Lunch-n-Learns presenting on a variety of topics. When DCYI learns of a topic or issue that the community may be interested in, we invite speakers to present on that topic. We have offered presentations on, Autism, Mitigating Negative Behaviors, Prevention of Teen Suicide, and Drugs in our Community. Well attended and well received, DCYI is proud to offer these trainings to the community-at-large.

JUVENILE JUSTICE: Helping the community realize the importance of Teen Court, the Towns of Parker, Castle Rock, City of Lone Tree and DCYI assisted in the development of Teen Court in Lone Tree. Also, through DCYI's efforts of collaborating with various juvenile justice agencies, DCYI helps coordinate service plans, so families can receive support as they go through this system.

WRAPAROUND:


WrapAround is an *intensive, individualized care planning and management process*. WrapAround is not a treatment *per se.* The WrapAround *process* aims to achieve positive outcomes by providing a structured, creative and individualized team planning process that results in plans that are effective and relevant to the child and family.



- WRAP is a voluntary program helping families solve difficult issues by identifying family strength and tackling family issues. A child must be between ages of 5-21. Most meetings take place in the home, and the process can last up to 12 months.
- A family can be referred to the program via self-referral, schools, Juvenile Assessment Center, or any number of agencies.
- A WrapAround facilitator meets the family to explain the process and highlight the voluntary and family-friendly nature. The facilitator listens to the family's take on their situation and conducts a strengths-based assessment.
- With support from the WrapAround team, the family develops an action plan. The Facilitator continues to provide advocacy and support services, while the family works on their individual plan.

In 2017, DCYI received 150 referrals, and worked with 80 families, representing 200 children, adults, and community partners. WrapAround strives to help families and save the community money, by helping students be less disruptive in school, finishing high school, experiencing fewer law enforcement contacts, and coordinating appropriate and needed services.

WRAP evaluates each family's involvement in 10 areas of importance. Average involvement is 60%. At this rate, we estimate saving the community approximately \$11-15,000 perfamily.



The Youth Initiative is a county-wide program that coordinates the various youth-serving efforts of Douglas County while determining the needs of its youngest residents. These activities are accomplished through different programs including a Youth and Family Resource Guide, an awards program, Youth Congress, and a WrapAround program. DCYI 2018 GOALS:

- 1. Serve 80-100 families via WRAP
- 2. Establish Teen Court for unincorporated youth: on-going; working with District Attorney's Office to offer Teen Court to Highlands Ranch youth
- 3. Begin an Early Prevention Program for children ages 0-10
- 4. Obtain a 4th year grant from the State Dept. of Human Services
- 5. Offer Project Upstream and Strategic Planning meetings to all DCSD schools

6. Develop a youth board – on-going; working on Youth Congress participants to serve as an advisory group

7. Add additional member to the WrapAround Professional Review Team

8. Community savings; work with County's Data Analyst to review DCYI's cost saving tool

9. Send Family Support Partner to state training and certification process

10. Continue working on Truancy related services with the school district and the Courts
