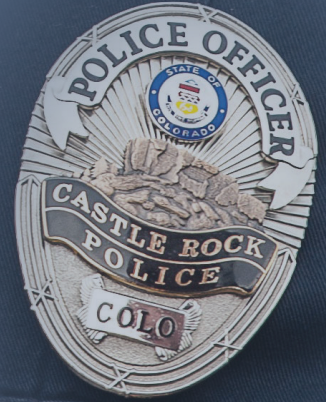

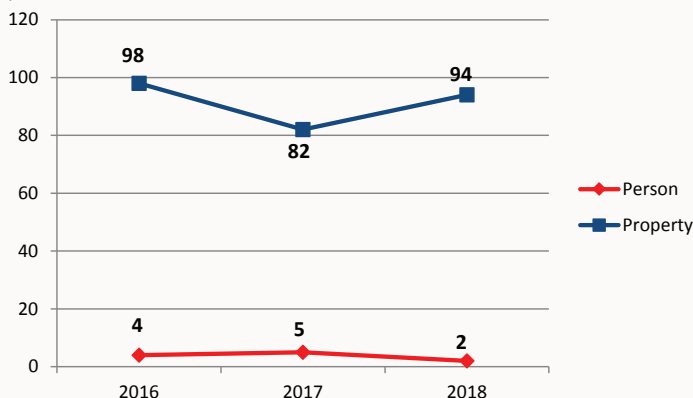

SPRING BREAK TIPS

With Spring Break just around the corner, and summer on the horizon, you may be thinking of taking advantage of your extra free-time and taking a trip. While your destination may be paradise, it is important to remember that paradise is not always crime free, especially when it comes to crimes related to identity theft. Here are some steps to take to ensure your safety while traveling:

1. Minimize what you bring with you – take out all unnecessary credit cards, charge cards, or other items, and make note of what you take with you in case something goes missing.
2. Be aware of your surroundings in especially tourist-full areas. These are prime spots for pick-pocketing and purse-snatching.
3. Avoid taking your checkbook, as the checks show a lot of personal information, such as: full name, address, bank name, checking account number, and routing number. If you don't want to use cash or cards, use traveler's checks.
4. Have the non-emergency number of the local police department on-hand, in case you need their assistance.
5. Do not post on social media that you will be away from your home.
6. Call Castle Rock Police Department's non-emergency number (below) to request an increased patrol of your home and/or neighborhood while you are away, or access the online request form at: CRgov.com/police (under the **How Do I** tab).

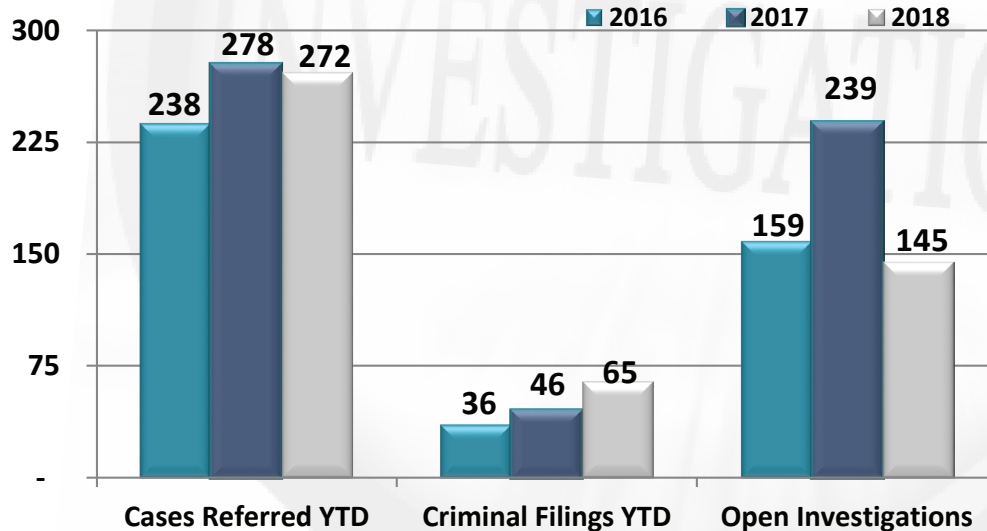


DETECTIVE UNIT

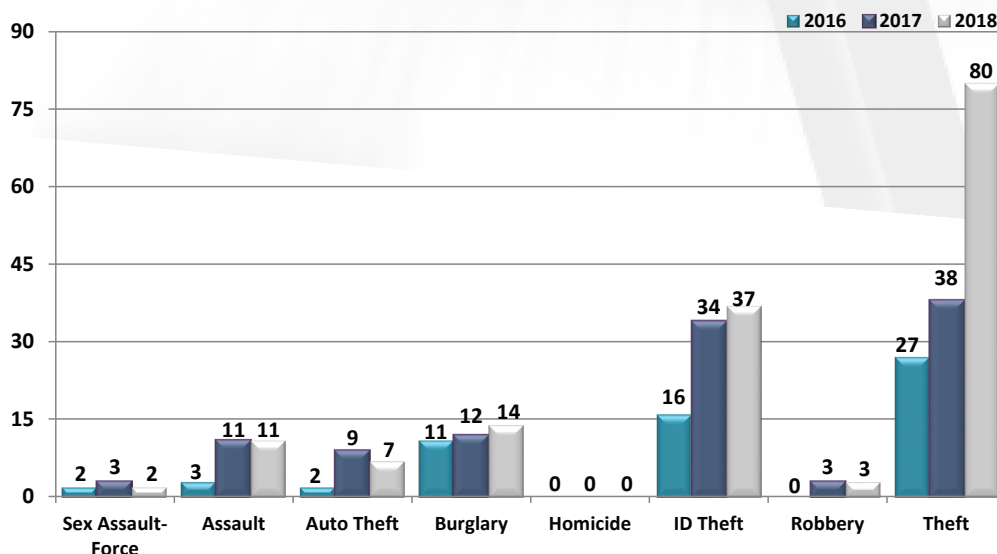
On February 20, 2018 Castle Rock Police officers and detectives investigated a report of an armed robbery in the parking lot at the King Soopers in Founders Village. The 40-year old victim reported that she was confronted by a man armed with a knife. The armed man then stole the woman's purse and fled. Detectives Steve Carney and Mike Williams conducted a number of interviews immediately after the robbery and in the days

following. The detectives were able to determine that the robbery was a false report, and they were able to recover the purse believed to have been stolen. The female who reported the robbery was charged with false reporting to authorities.

(2016-2018)

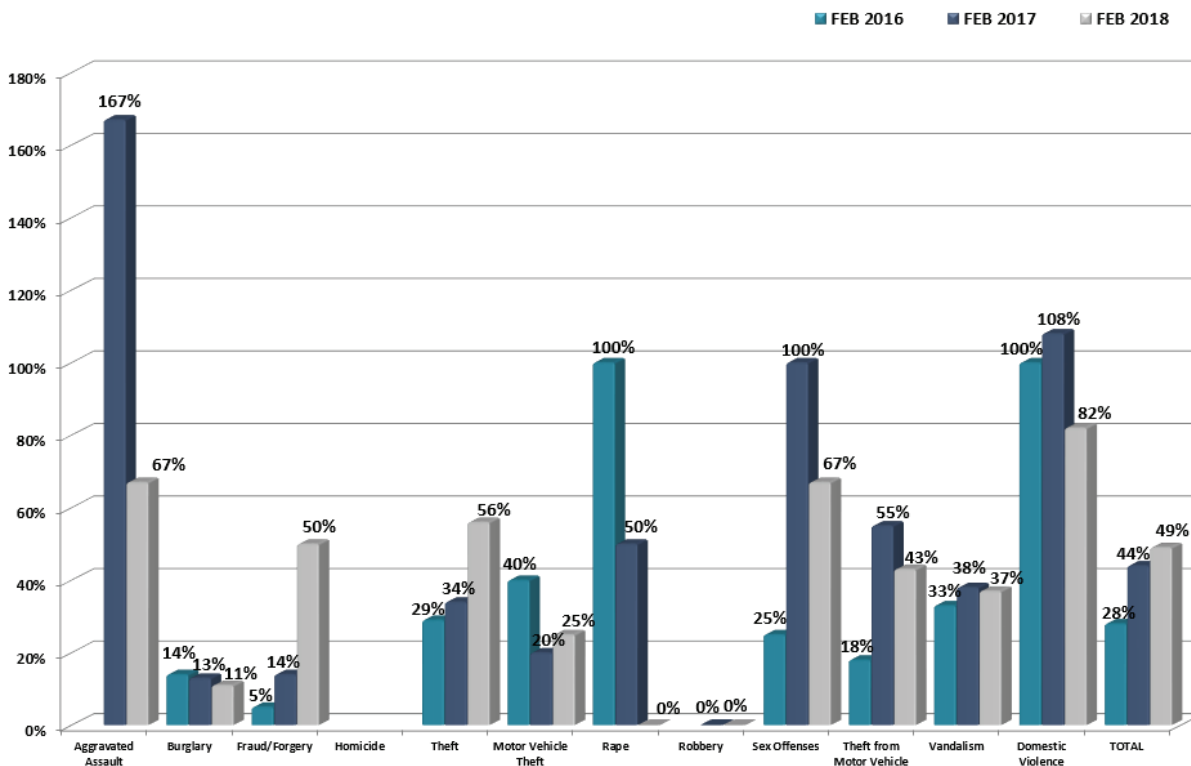

Liquor code inspections were *not* conducted during the month of FEBRUARY.



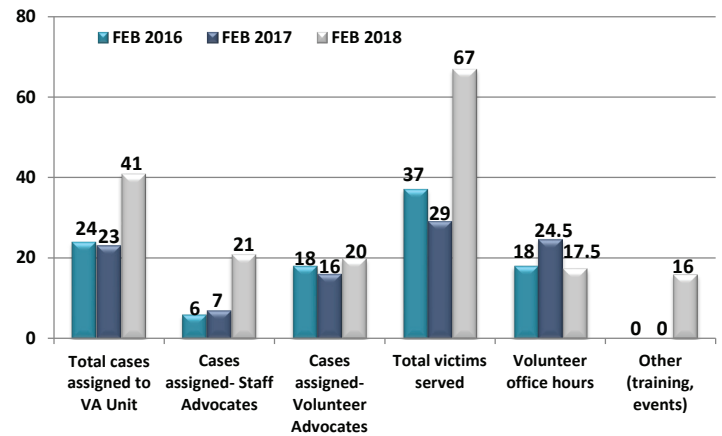
VICTIMS ASSISTANCE (VA) UNIT

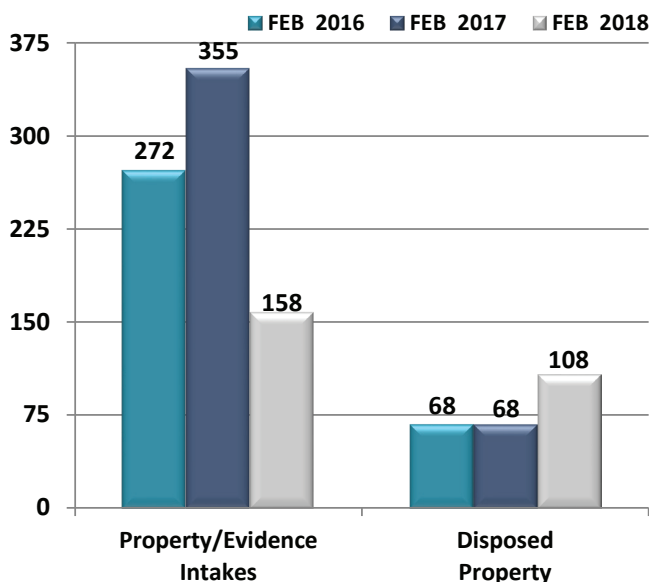

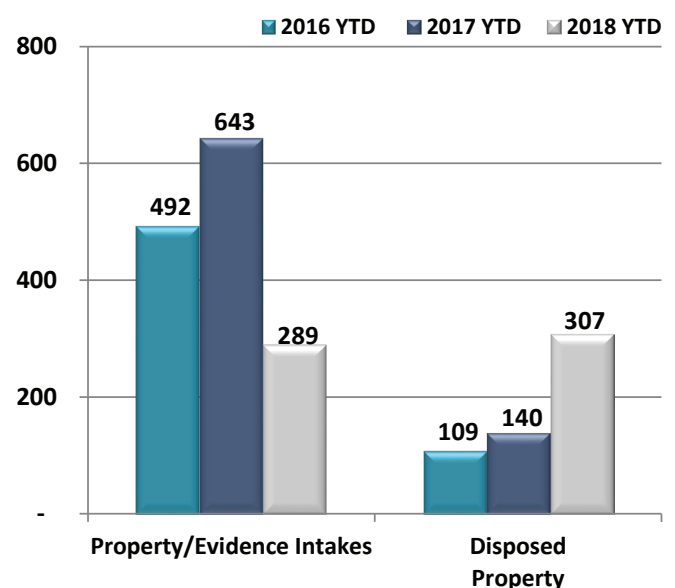

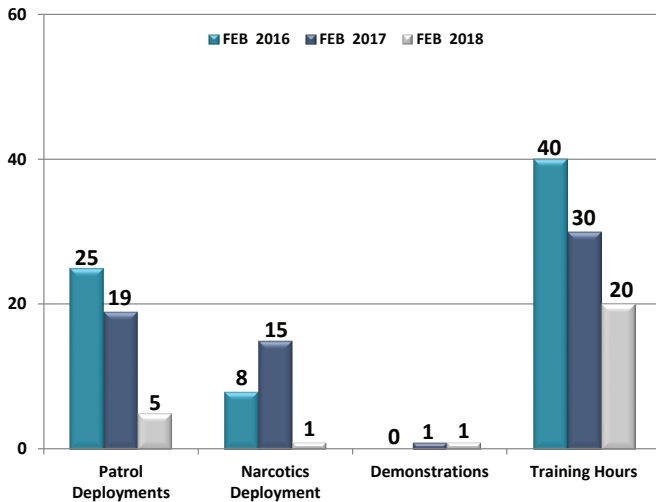
Demonstrations - A K9 demonstration was conducted at Castle Rock Bible Church by Ronin and Officer Thompson.

Other - Titan was released to modified duty and returns to work in March.

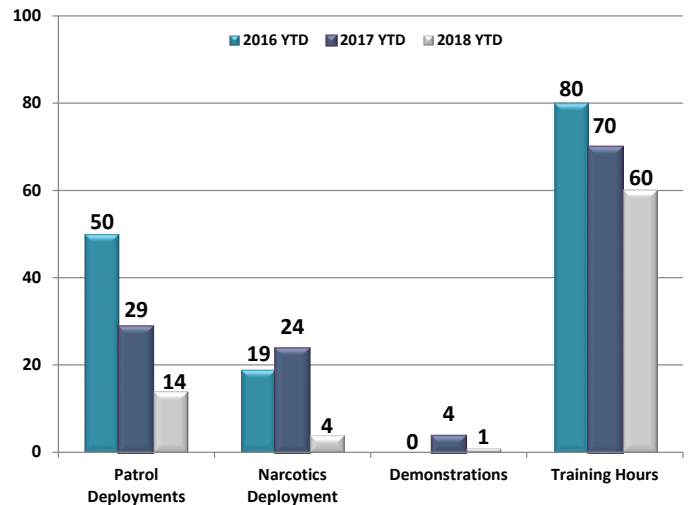

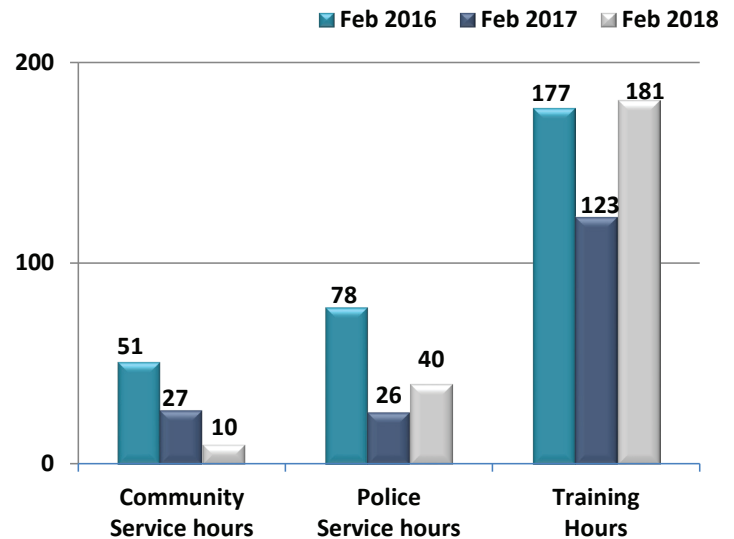

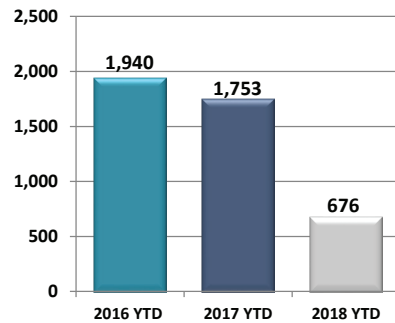

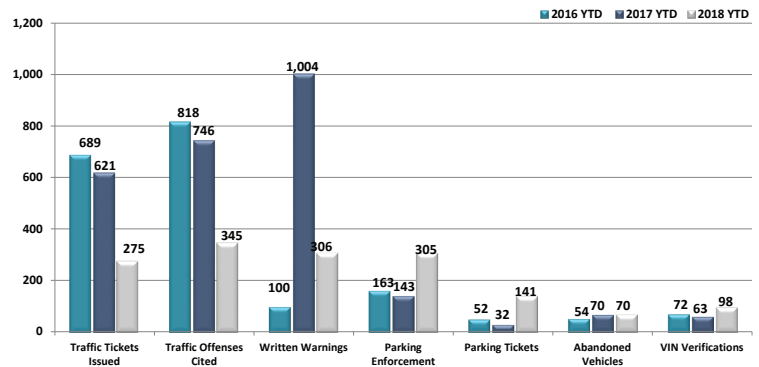

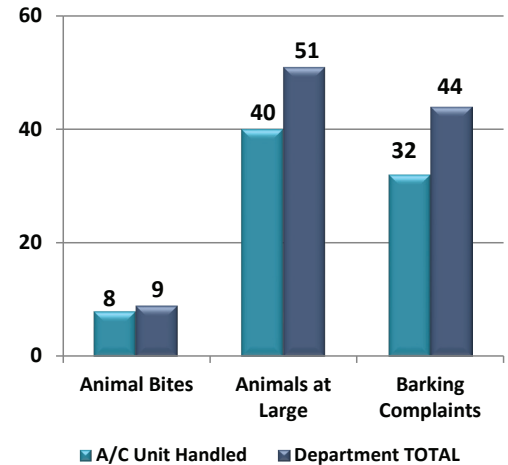

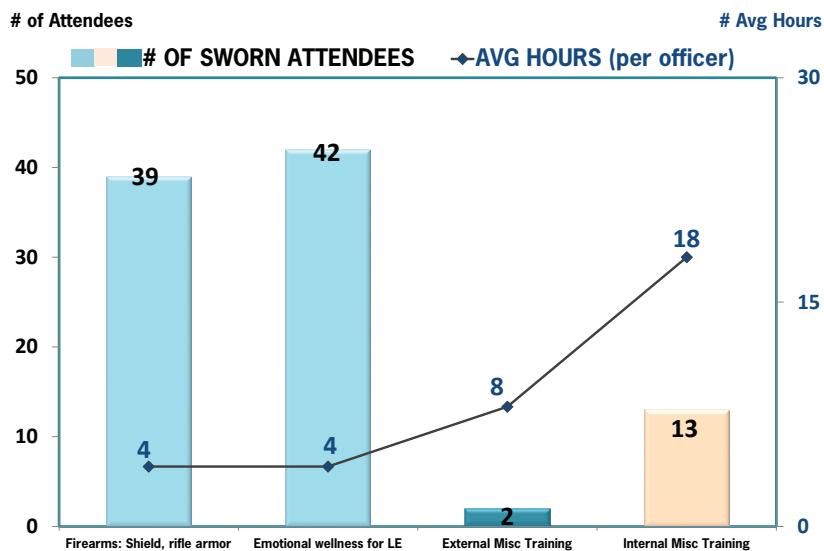

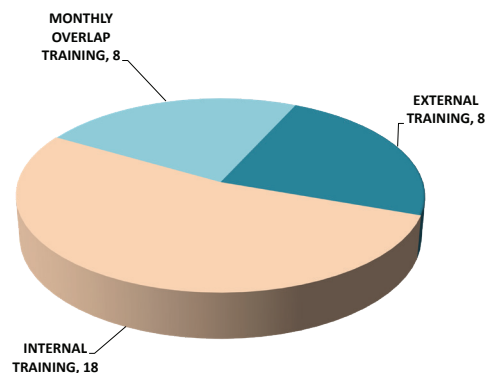

TRAINING OVERVIEW FEBRUARY 2018



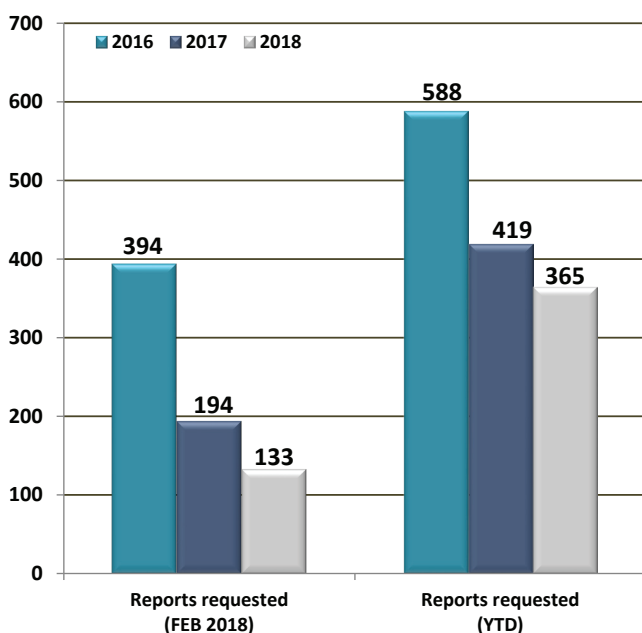
TRAINING HOURS BY CATEGORY (AVERAGE PER OFFICER) FEBRUARY 2018



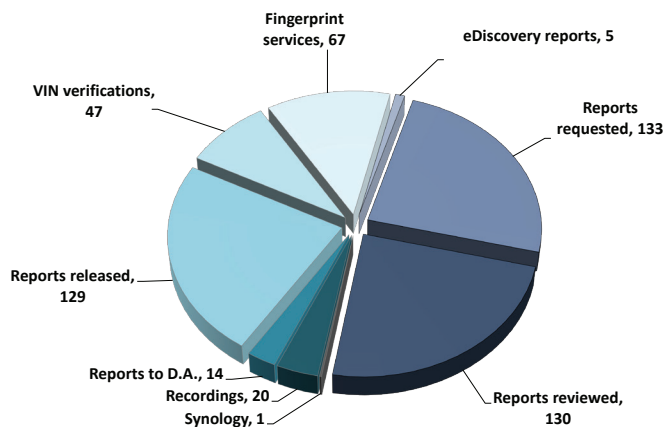

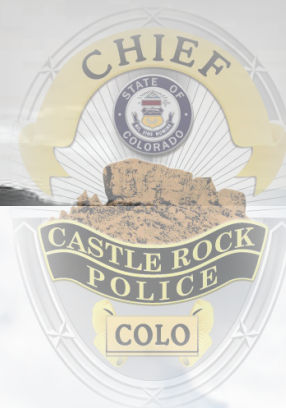
