


About Teen Court

Teen Court is a diversion-like program, nested under the Municipal Court, based on restorative justice principles. It offers an alternative



to the traditional juvenile justice system for low-risk, first-time misdemeanor offenders. Juveniles are offered a deferred prosecution plea agreement and appear before a jury of their peers, who decide on an appropriate sentence. Teen Court holds juveniles accountable for their delinquent behavior and uses positive peer pressure and creative alternative sentencing to promote long-term behavioral change. Youth volunteers, who are responsible for determining the sentences for their peers, are trained on how to perform questioning, utilize the principles of restorative justice, and develop a sentence that is best for each Teen Court respondent.

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Teen Court's Non-Traditional Sentencing



DC Substance Abuse Prevention



Honoring Deputy Zack Parrish


Deputy Parrish, a former CRPD Officer, had given up multiple evenings to come and participate in Teen Court hearings, which gave our defendants a positive learning experience and made an impact on creating positive change in their lives. The Teen Court volunteers wanted to be a part of honoring Zack after he was killed in the line of duty. CRPD asked the volunteers to help honor Zack by making over 20 decorated drop-boxes to be placed around Castle Rock. Members of the community were then able to drop letters into these boxes, which were later placed in a memorial time capsule in Zack's gear locker. It was amazing to see not only our volunteers, but their parents, siblings, and grandparents quickly join in on helping with the memorial.






