The Parks and Recreation Department announces Paddle Days at Rueter-Hess Reservoir

In August, the Parks and Recreation Department was excited to unveil its plan to host inaugural Paddle Days at Rueter-Hess Reservoir.

The reservoir, located along Hess Road roughly one mile east of Interstate 25 and Castle Pines Parkway, provides drinking water for the Parker Water and Santitation District. The Rueter-Hess Recreation Authority was established to oversee the master planning process of



bringing recreation to the reservoir site. Authority partners include Castle Rock, Douglas County, Parker, the cities of Lone Tree and Castle Pines and the Parker Water and Sanitation District.

To allow residents to experience the reservoir prior to officially opening to the public, both the Town of Castle Rock and Town of Parker host special events and programs in which registered participants can enter and use the facility. The reservoir was open from 8 a.m. to noon on select dates in August and September. Participants could canoe, kayak or stand-up paddleboard to explore everything the reservoir has to offer. More than 400 people used 349 watercraft vessels to see the sites.

PARKS, OPEN SPACE AND TRAILS – PLANNING AND CONSTRUCTION DIVISION

Meadows Neighborhood Park

Staff received construction bids on Aug. 13 for the new neighborhood park that will be located in The Meadows near Aspen View Academy Charter School. The low responsive bidder was GoodLand Construction, Inc. The Parks and Recreation Department made a recommendation to use GoodLand and Town Council approved a contract on Aug. 21.



The Town's Development Services Department is making final comments on the future park's construction drawings prior to releasing permits. Once permits are released, construction will commence. The project is scheduled to be completed in spring 2019.

A community outreach plan was developed and implemented for naming the new neighborhood park. From mid-July throughout August, staff executed the following items to garner community feedback:

 Created and posted a survey to CRgov.com/FutureParks. Residents could offer or vote for names provided by the project's design firm, Norris Design. The survey was live on the Town's website from July 17 through Aug. 31. A total of 703 people submitted responses.



- Distributed flyers and posters at the Recreation Center, Town Hall, the Miller Activity Complex and Aspen View Academy Charter School to encourage survey participation.
- Ran banner ads on the LED signs at Philip S. Miller Park and Town Hall.
- Issued a press release regarding the initiative on July 24, and posted the press release to the Town's social media accounts on Nextdoor, Twitter and Facebook. Supplemental social media posts were also featured on Aug. 1, 6, 15 and 27.

Once the survey closed, staff provided a summarized naming list suggestion to the project's official naming committee. The naming committee will soon take a recommendation to the Parks and Recreation Commission in September and Town Council in October for approval.

Central Service Center

August proved to be a productive month for the new Central Service Center. This 13,000-squarefoot building will host the Town's Parks Maintenance and Facilities divisions, located at the end of Caprice Drive near the former wastewater treatment plant. Building plans include five maintenance bays, indoor storage, a training facility, office space, a break room and a storage yard for equipment and material.



The project's general contractor, Taylor Kohrs, erected the steel structure. The siding and roofing panels arrived on site and will soon be installed. The structural soil import, site grading and underground utility installation also continued throughout the month.

Crews will soon begin the installation of underground mechanical, electrical and plumbing, followed by the interior concrete floors. Finishes will then commence inside the building while paving operations race to beat the weather.

OPEN SPACE PROJECTS

Colorado Bluebird Project

At the end of August, bluebird nest box monitoring concluded for the season. Volunteers switched from monitoring to performing data entry. This action ensures that Castle Rock's breeding data on bluebirds and swallows is logged with national population tracking studies managed by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. Final project numbers will be available the



end of September. This year's project totals will then be calculated and analyzed with previous years' data to contribute to an ongoing 12-year collection.

Early next month, staff will host a recognition and season wrap-up potluck celebration for the bluebird volunteers at the Millhouse at Philip S. Miller Park. The celebration will thank the volunteers for their dedication to the project and provide a summary of the breeding activity at all 32 sites.

The Colorado Bluebird Project operates under the guidance of the Audubon Society of Greater Denver and is offered through POST Partners Volunteer program in Castle Rock. This volunteer project aims to improve the vitality of bluebird populations throughout Colorado and inform and educate the public.

Pollinator Garden

The Town's Natural Resource Specialist began working with Parks Maintenance staff to plan and design a pollinator garden for Castle Rock's Town Hall. These gardens benefit pollinators like native bees, butterflies, moths, flies, beetles and hummingbirds. The garden will incorporate native grasses, shrubs and wildflowers of varying colors that bloom throughout the growing season. The



site was prepped with soil amendment and irrigation was installed. The area is now ready for fall planting. In addition to addressing pollinator needs, the garden will provide a place for educational demonstrations to inspire residents to plant similar gardens in their own backyards.

Facility Operations

The Miller Activity Complex at Philip S. Miller Park continued its summer streak of above average participation in August. Seniors showed the largest growth in year-over-year participation with an 11 percent increase over August 2017.

Since August is traditionally the slowest month of the year at the Recreation Center, it is the perfect time to perform major repairs and maintenance projects. In addition to the annual one-week maintenance closure, extended closures were necessary to improve the gym and aquatic venues.

This year marked the first year that all of the gym walls were repainted during a facility closure since the Recreation Center remodel in 2006. The colors selected increase the amount of natural light and brighten the gym, the recreation center lobby and both weight rooms. The gym floor was also refurbished.
