Re: 2018 Castle Rock Senior Activity Center Year End Town Contract Report

Dear Mr. Corliss and Ms. Muller,

2018 was another amazing year of growth for the Castle Rock Senior Activity Center, with our membership reaching 1,064 seniors. With this increase, so did the demand for more activities and programs. We also saw a rise in our transportation services, providing an average of 700 rides per month.

With grant funding and town-support remaining steady, we continue to meet the needs of our growing senior population. With another successful year of fundraising, we were able to replace two more of our vehicles and our oldest bus in our fleet. This is in line with our vehicle replacement program, thus reducing the cost of maintenance expense and to have provided vehicles with the best safety and reliability for our riders and volunteer drivers.

The Center greatly appreciates the support we have received from the Town of Castle Rock and recognizes that we could not make the impact we do in seniors' lives without your ongoing support. It is our belief to continue to support and give back to our community. We plan to continue past activities such as sponsoring the Trolley, participating and volunteering our buses for the shuttling of the artists at the Artfest, as well as continuing to find new ways. We believe one of our ways is our Douglas County-wide outreach event, the "Senior Life Expo," at the Douglas County Events Center. This will be our 5<sup>th</sup> year of organizing this event on April 18, 2019.

Collaboration and Partnerships are key to helping Seniors in our community. In doing so, we continue to be active members in several groups, such as Douglas County Transit Solutions, The Douglas County Seniors' Council, Douglas County Community of Care, Douglas County Volunteer Coalition, Leadership Douglas County, Douglas County Non-Profit Coalition and other community and transportation groups.

I've attached several documents to support many of the Center's statistics. Please feel free to let me know if you are in need of any other documents. Below are the 2018 Performance Objectives and their outcomes for last year.

## 2018 PROPOSED PERFORMANCE OBJECTIVES

## **Programs and Activities**

1.) Provide over 130+ activities and/or events per month that are recognized as essential components to healthy and successful aging.

In 2018 we averaged over 158 activities and events for our very active and diversely aged senior population each month. With having three buses we have been able to accommodate taking more seniors on our trips. When we have been limited to smaller group numbers by the venues, we try to add additional trip dates to serve our growing waiting lists. In 2018 we did three large charter bus tours – the first one was a tour of Colfax – the longest street in Colorado and another on Robert Speer's Denver. Our third trip was an overnight of the Front Range wineries from Bailey to Canon City. Our bucket list trips remain very popular for our adventures enthusiasts such as Go Karting, Zip-lining and a Vail Gondola trip to see the fall colors. With several sports teams and fitness programs to choose from, one can stay very active with softball, golf,

bowling, snowshoeing, or hiking. We have also added more inside programs for those seniors who do not want to seek adventure but want to be exposed to new experiences. We have done this by offering Discovery hours, where we bring the adventure to the Center – these topic have been about the CR Fire Department Drone program, Route 66, and an Abe Lincoln Impersonator.

2.) Continue to serve over 2500 (duplicated) senior participants each month with social, cultural, and educational opportunities.

Our membership continues to rise. We ended 2018 with 1,064 members, and this is a 4% increase since last year. Since our membership demographic has a natural ebb and flow, it does naturally decline each year, thus a 4% increase is a substantial rise. We gained 293 new members. Participation numbers grew as well this year; and, we are averaging over 4,000 participants each month. This is a15% increase from this time last year. Some of our trips use all three of our fleet buses. At other times (due to the size of the venues being only able to accommodate small groups), we run the trips more than one time.

3.) Continue to expand awareness of and attention of our volunteer programs at the Center.

Volunteers are a vital part of our Center and many of its programs. Our biggest recruitment is word of mouth from our current volunteers. They truly love the work they are doing at the center. We also utilize outreach opportunities to recruit volunteers such as volunteer fairs, church groups and online volunteer programs. We also promote our volunteering opportunities at our Senior Life Expo and Craft Show events. This is in addition to the use of social media, email marketing and local press to seek volunteers.

## **Transportation**

1.) Continue to provide over 600+ rides to seniors and those adults with disabilities to medical appointments, social events, and basic living needs.

In 2018, on an average we provided close to 700 rides a month. The transportation program was available 245 days last year. With the Holidays and the annual closure we were only closed 16 business day (can you believe - no snow days last year), this making an average of 34 rides per day.

We prioritize our ride requests by medical first, nutrition and grocery second, and then by local priority. With 3 to 4 vehicles on the road for the shuttle service Monday thru Friday, and an average of 5-6 specials each week, our vehicles are very busy during the week. Specials are one-on-one rides to medical appointments outside our shuttle area (i.e. VA Hospital, Swedish Hospital, etc.). This is the area that we have seen the most growth in and when compared to last year, we provided 377 rides vs 328 last year. This is a 13% growth in special rides. Our program is limited by the amount of vehicles and volunteers available each day, but as you can see we continue to serve the growing needs.

## **Health & Wellness**

1.) Continue to provide VOA low cost meals 3 times a week, and continue to coordinate Meals on Wheels weekly home deliveries to qualified clients.

This program continues to be an important element of our center. We know that for many seniors, this may be the only hot meal they eat that day. Volunteers of America has expanded the hot lunch program now to

include snack box and leftovers containers for seniors to take food home. This has been very well received by the diners. In addition, delivering the Meals on Wheels to the community is also another way we know that home bound seniors are getting the meals that they need.

## 2.) Continue to expand the wellness programming to serve the needs of the seniors.

Our new program, Discovery Talks, has been a big hit with the membership. This is a quarterly program that involves hands on or interactive programming at the Center. We want to provide more of these types of programs onsite, at low cost to our seniors, to have experiences without having to leave the Center. The programs we have offered so far are:

Abe Lincoln and Mary Todd (Impersonators)
Route 66 – This was a two part series over two months
Castle Rock Fire Department Drone Program
NFL – Since 1970

We have over 50 participants at each of these events.

Our new class this year was Tai Chi for Arthritis. We offer 6-week beginner and advanced classes. This was a huge hit with an ongoing waiting list for the upcoming sessions.

We continue to offer a low vision support group, blood pressure spot, hearing checks, and lung function screenings as great resources for seniors to keep a watch on their changing health. Our monthly Lunch and Learns, Matter of Balance courses, and Preventing Diabetes programs are appreciated by all those who attend, and are in place to improve their health.

## **Center Objectives**

## 1.) Continue to expand our use and roll out new portions of the database software system implemented in 2016.

The sign-in kiosk system has been a help with data collection for us. We have also added the recording of volunteer hours at the kiosk too. We also implemented our activity and services sign up in the system, along with donor information. The database has reduced the amount of paper records and also given us the ability to view the information in real time as well as remotely. We started using a new transportation software program from the County in October. This software is already starting to show a better picture of how we are serving the community. I look forward to sharing some of those reports in 2019.

## 2.) Be a leader in the community outreach for Senior Resources – April 19<sup>th</sup>, 2018 4th Annual Senior Life Expo – Douglas County Events Center.

This year marked our 4<sup>th</sup> year of the "Senior Life Expo." We had 80 Community Partners this year. This was a 15% increase over last year. More than 600 seniors and/or family members came to the event this year.

We feel that this event is very important to the community as we know how incredibly difficult it is to find information about senior services - everything from housing to hospice care. The expo is a one-stop shop for all kinds of senior resources; many of the attendees from this year loved how they were able to get so many questions answered and information all in one place. I have attached the program book along with this report so that you can see what a wonderful event this is for our community.

Please mark your calendars for our  $5^{th}$  Annual "Senior Life Expo" on April  $18^{th}$ , 2019 from 1-5 @ the Douglas County Events Center. We would love you see to how this is connecting Seniors with our community's services.

The Center greatly appreciates the support that we receive from the Town of Castle Rock and recognize that we could not make the impact we do in Senior's life without your ongoing support. We believe that with our partnership we truly extend lives and help Senior's "Love Life in the Second Half.

The Castle Rock Senior Activity Center is a place where Seniors come for friendships, education, and experiences. We wish to be a leader and mentor in the Senior Activity Center Industry. During 2018, we had 5 different Senior Centers reach out to us to consult on how our model works. Three of the centers here in Colorado (Highlands Ranch, Monument/Tri-Lakes Area and Summit County) came and visited, while the other two from Louisiana and Washington State were phone conferences. We were honored that the word is out on what were are accomplishing here in Castle Rock for the Senior Population I receive many letters during the year on how we are make a difference for seniors. I have enclosed a letter that you might see how with your support and partnership with the center, we are making a difference in the community







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
