Roadwork starts in The Meadows

Summer is right around the corner. While for some people that means cook-outs and time by the pool, for the Town, it means road maintenance. Keeping roads in top shape is important for their safety and longevity. The Town budgets and plans for road maintenance on a five-year rotation. This year, the Pavement Maintenance Program will be in The Meadows.



Crews will be working on neighborhood roads between April and August, weather dependent. In 2019, the Town will be investing more than \$15 million in road maintenance. Funding is primarily from the Town's Transportation Fund, which includes revenues from sales tax, motor vehicle tax and building use tax.

Founders/Crowfoot Valley update

Big improvements are coming to Founders Parkway and Crowfoot Valley Road. Once complete, that will mean improved traffic flow and safety. In the meantime, residents should expect delays as we make way for better roads ahead.

The Town is finalizing plans to begin improving the intersection this spring. The \$3.5 million project includes widening Founders Parkway between Woodlands Boulevard and Crowfoot Valley Road, and widening Crowfoot Valley Road between Founders Parkway and Knobcone Drive.

Break up with boredom at Rec camps

Each year, Castle Rock Parks and Recreation hosts a series of spring break camps, giving children the opportunity to learn, create and play while school is out. Offerings range from an hour up to a full day.

Five camps will be available Monday, March 18, through Friday, March 22:

- Rock Rec Camp: This day camp involves three field trips, two swimming days and structured activities like games, sports and crafts.
- STEMplicity Games Lego Camp: Designed for ages 5-12, this camp is a fun way to learn various science, engineering and architectural concepts.
- Youth Fencing Camp: An afternoon specialty camp, these classes combine fitness and creativity to teach the Olympic sport of fencing.
- Dance Camp: These camps help kids explore new movements and adventures. Themes are Princesses and Heroes and Trolls Hip Hop.
- Pottery Boot Camp: An hour-long class for four days, this camp teaches the basics of pottery.

Open house to gather input on keeping ducks, mini goats and mini pigs in Town

Municipal Code currently prohibits keeping ducks, mini goats and mini pigs within Town limits. But should that be the case? The Town wants to know what you think.

Town Council in 2018 updated the Municipal Code concerning animals. At that time, it was decided that Town staff should continue exploring issues surrounding certain types of animals residents may wish to keep within Castle Rock.

The Council further discussed this last month and directed Town staff to make recommendations regarding the keeping of ducks, mini goats and mini pigs in Castle Rock. Before staff makes recommendations to Council, they would like public feedback. An open house is planned from 5:30 to 7 p.m. Tuesday, April 9, in Council Chambers at Town Hall. Attend to review and comment on draft regulations. Or, do so online at CRgov.com/animals between April 8 and April 21.

Wise up with Water Wiser

Conservation is key. It's a message Castle Rock Water is spreading to help support the Town's long-term water plan. While our community has embraced the call to conserve, there's always room for improvement. Residents looking to cut back can get expert tips at Castle Rock Water's Water Wiser workshops.

The department holds workshops to teach residents about how they can conserve around their homes. The ultimate goal is for the entire community to cut back 18 percent by using water efficiently. The interactive workshops teach customers how to detect water waste in their yards and how to improve their irrigation systems. Once complete, participants will earn a "Water Wiser" designation and will be exempt from the every-third-day watering schedule. Participants are also eligible for turf removal and irrigation product rebates.

The designation is valid for five years. So, participants who took the class before 2014 will need to take a renewal course to maintain, or reinstate, their designation. Water Wiser workshops run from March through October. The workshops are free, but registration is required. Did you know more than one trillion gallons of water nationwide is wasted annually through leaks? Fix a Leak Week, March 18-24, is a reminder to track down those leaky faucets, toilets and showers. Toilets account for the largest indoor leaks, wasting as much as 5 gallons of water per minute. Check for toilet leaks by dropping dye tablets, or a few drops of food coloring, in the toilet tank. Wait a few minutes. If color appears in the bowl, that means you have a leak. The flapper is the most likely cause of leaks. Replacing the flapper can be a simple and inexpensive DIY project. Additionally, most faucet leaks can be fixed by simply replacing a gasket. Track down those leaks, make some simple repairs, and save valuable water and money all year long!
