"I just want to express my respect for how you all handled the [car crash] event, and gratitude for how you all helped my wife and granddaughter... The point here is: you don't know all the background and details of everyone's lives you help, therefore you don't always know how much of a difference you really make.

Officer Smith and your team found the driver who continued on after the collision, secured the accident area from all four sides, blocked traffic upstream to minimize backups at the roundabout, made sure you knew the status of people near, kept us out of the way but allowed me to have eye contact and talk to [her] which was a huge deal for both of us...I also saw officers comforting both throughout the few minutes I was there. You even had a police car moved so I could take the quickest route to the hospital. It was so well-organized, I just wanted to say how impressed I was with the professionalism I observed.

Officer Body came to the hospital, it was only later I learned he was there because there'd been a [young] child in the accident and he wanted to make sure everything was ok. That really impacted me, that you have people in positions to assist emotionally when there's a crisis and/or emotional situation. I can't say enough about how gracious Officer Body was to [us]...you handled a horrible situation in ways that made the difference, [my wife] was so grateful I can't even express it and [my granddaughter] was sitting in the ER with a stuffed animal "from the police people," smiling.

We're so fortunate to live where we do and have such amazing people to rely on in times of extreme need, people that make the difference in professional and personal ways. I appreciate you last Friday, and I've always appreciated all of the police, every day."







Animal Control Response Comparison JULY 2019







Ronin and Officer Thompson


Patrol Deployments: 4


