



TOWN COUNCIL APPROVED RESOLUTION ACCEPTING DONATION FROM ROBERT F. METZLER



This gift from the Estate of Robert F. Metzler consists of approximately 60 acres and a homestead and silo near Founders Parkway and Crowfoot Valley Road.

Born September 5, 1923, Bob Metzler was a cattle rancher, educator,

artist, musician, adventurer, developer and philanthropist. Brother to Rosemary Metzler, they were the grandchildren of Irish immigrants Patrick and Margaret Lucas, who were among the first homesteaders in Douglas County. The Lucas family settled 160 acres in what is now Castlewood Canyon State Park and built a wooden house in 1894 to raise eight children.

Both Bob and Rosemary developed a love of learning and education from parents Mary (Lucas) and August Metzler at an early age. Rosemary taught English for 33 years in Douglas County, specializing in Shakespeare and British Literature, and she later authored a series of popular children's books. Bob received his BA and MA degrees from Denver University and



began his career in education in 1944 as a teacher in a oneroom school. After serving as principal, Bob was

eventually elected County Superintendent of Douglas County Schools.

To honor this donation and the Metzler heritage, the property will be named the Metzler Family Open Space. The site is part of the original Metzler Ranch Planned Unit Development of 770 acres, which was annexed into Castle Rock in 1984. This tract is the last remaining, undeveloped parcel from the original annexation area. Once finalized, this will be among the largest land donations the Town of Castle Rock has ever received.

Certain conditions will be necessary to reflect the desires and intent of the donor. The Douglas Land Conservancy will

manage a conservation easement to limit the uses of the property to preserve its natural state. This local nonprofit is dedicated to land



conservation within the County. DLC's easement will govern approximately 49 acres, including a 4-acre tract containing the homestead and ranch buildings. The Town has committed to restoring or preserving the historic silo, but will assess the long-term viability and use of the additional structures in the future.

The additional 11 acres is being donated as an educational parcel and will contain a future parking lot to provide access. This site could also feature a future community or educational building, depending on Town Council direction and available funding, but would be subject to the declaration of covenants within the land deed.

The Town has allocated \$1.6 million for various improvements, including soft-surface trails, parking and interpretative signage and is anticipating to close on the property in June.

The 168-acre site is located in eastern Castle Rock, near Castle Oaks and Arabella drives. Ultimately, the property will serve as a regional destination for the entire community. The first phase of the project will develop approximately 12 acres and will include an entry road off of Castle Oaks Drive, off-street parking, picnic pavilions, playground areas, a pump track for biking, a half-court for basketball, a lawn area, concrete sidewalks and landscaping. Six pickleball courts and a plumbed restroom were also added to this first phase. A groundbreaking event will be held at noon on Wednesday, June 30 to officially mark the commencement of construction. Learn more at CRgov.com/FutureParks.

NEW MURAL UNVEILED TO PAINT POSITIVITY

To instill community cheer and good spirit, the Town of Castle Rock Public Art Commission in partnership with the Castle Rock Artist Cooperative plans to bring a slew of grassroots public art installations to Downtown this summer.

The Painting Positivity Campaign officially launched on Friday, June 4 with the unveiling of a mural at The Fort CPA Group, 407 Wilcox St. Over 30 people attended the dedication event to celebrate the art installation with the artists.

The Commission issued a call for proposals in March, and artists were invited to submit designs to provide a large-scale work of art to inspire positivity, unity and hope. After reviewing more than 70 submissions, artists Emma Gottschalk and Josh Eller were selected.

Combined, Gottschalk and Eller have nearly a decade of experience in fine art, mural production and graphic design, making them an ideal team. The artists' vision was to use vibrant colors, bold illustration style and inspiring language to enhance the vibrancy of Castle Rock.

ADVENTURE CLUB PRESCHOOL

The Parks and Recreation Department's Adventure Club Preschool offers a secure, enriching and nurturing environment where children are able to establish the solid educational foundations required for success in future academic and social endeavors. Adventure Club serves ages two and a half through five and offers state-licensed Junior Preschool, Preschool and Prekindergarten programs.

A graduation ceremony was held on Monday, May 24 at the close of the 2020-2021 school year. The division hosted graduation at the Amphitheater at Philip S. Miller Park. The children sang songs for the parents and walked across the stage to receive diplomas. A reception followed.


Registration is already demonstrating strong enrollment for the 2021-2022 school year, which opened on Tuesday, Jan. 19. All morning classes are full at this time. To meet demand, staff will be offering an additional three-day prekindergarten class. As a result, every available classroom will be full with Adventure Club programs each day. With only 31 spots remaining, people are encouraged to register in person with Youth Specialist Mindy Fortin at the Recreation Center.

RUETER-HESS PADDLE DAYS RETURN

Float your kayak, canoe or stand-up paddle board at the Rueter-Hess Reservoir this summer.

Just minutes from Downtown Castle Rock, the reservoir sits on Hess Road, one mile east of I-25 at the Castle Pines Parkway exit. The property is owned and managed by the Parker Water and Sanitation District. While the district's top priority is maintaining water quality, the Rueter-Hess Recreation Authority plans future recreational opportunities. The Authority is composed of appointed representatives from the Town of Castle Rock, Town of Parker, City of Lone Tree, City of Castle Pines, Douglas County and the District.

Paddle Days will be held Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays from May 28 through Sept. 5. Reservations are required for each person entering the facility and will be available one week prior to the first of each month. The entrance fee is \$15 per person and no day-of or gate reservations will be available. Participants should plan to bring their own watercraft. For more information visit RHRecreation.org.


CLIMB4CHANGE EVENT RAISED OVER \$6,000 FOR ADAPTIVE RECREATION

The Climb4Change Adaptive Recreation fundraiser was held on Saturday, May 22. Volunteers, businesses and families with children with cognitive and physical disabilities banded together to host this race up the 200-step Challenge Hill at Philip S. Miller Park. This year's event offered participants many opportunities to ascend the 178 vertical feet of climb. Nearly 300 racers participated in six race formats. This year's Climb4Change raised \$2,950 from sponsorships to further the mission of ensuring everyone in the community has access to recreational opportunities; net program revenue will also contribute to this cause.
