TOWN COUNCIL PASSES ORDINANCE AMENDING MUNICIPAL CODE, APPROVING NOXIOUS WEED MANAGEMENT PLAN


Noxious weeds are non-native plants that displace or out-compete native plants for soil moisture and degrade natural habitat. Many noxious weeds are undesirable to cattle and wildlife, and can even be toxic. It is important to manage noxious weeds in our area through identification, prevention and control of infestations.

In an effort to mitigate the spread of noxious weeds, the State adopted the Colorado Noxious Weed Act as included in Title 35 of the Colorado Revised Statutes. This law requires all Colorado residents, including local land managers, to control noxious weeds. The law groups weeds into three categories – A, B and C, which helps determine if the respective weed should be eradicated, contained or controlled. According to the Colorado Noxious Weed Act, municipalities have certain responsibilities that include:

- Establishment of a local advisory board
- Adoption and administration of a noxious weed management plan
- Treat public lands, including rights-of-way, to impede the spread of noxious weeds

In order to align with state statute, the Town Council recently established a local weed advisory board as an auxiliary function of the Parks and Recreation Commission, approved a Noxious Weed Management Plan and updated Town Code to reflect the plan and state statute.

NATIONAL TRAILS DAY

Volunteers blazed trails at Gateway Mesa Open Space! On Saturday June 5, 34 volunteers contributed 290 working hours to celebrate National Trails Day. The volunteers braved the heat to break ground on the final section of Legacy Trail, which will travel through a previously inaccessible, forested area of the open space. Volunteers for Outdoor Colorado (VOC) has been leading efforts to expand the trail, and it is expected to be finished later this year. Thank you, volunteers!

Please be aware, the new portion of the trail is still a work in progress and is not ready for hikers. It doesn't have an exit point, so please respect the trail closure signs when you see the new intersection of the trail. The completed western 1-mile section of Legacy Trail is open for hiking. JULY FOURTH PREPARATIONS

Staff regularly inspects the flag for damage and it typically gets replaced three to five times per year, depending on weather. Staff also climbs to the top to lower the flag to half-staff during federal and state orders. There's no question our parks team is committed and takes this responsibility seriously.

PAVILION RESERVATIONS

Picnic pavilions may be reserved at select Town parks from March through October; pavilions are open for general use from November through February. Pavilion reservation requests must be submitted at least two weeks prior to the date being requested. Pavilions available for reservation include: Bison Park, Butterfield Crossing Park, Centennial Park, Founders Park, Rock Park, Matney Park, Mosman Pavilion at Metzler Ranch Community Park, Philip S. Miller Park (special rate applies), Rhyolite Regional Park and Wrangler Park.
